

Using White Space Effectively

White space refers to the parts of a document that are not occupied by text or images. Used effectively, white space can dramatically improve the visual appeal of a document. The advantages of white space include:

- making the document easier to read
- giving the document an elegant, "clean" appearance
- separating parts of the document from each other
- attracting the reader's eyes to a specific part of the document

Observe how white space works effectively in this car advertisement:



The white space immediately focuses the reader's attention on the car and the words "Think small." The advertisement has an elegant appearance that is not cluttered by unnecessary words or images—its effectiveness lies in its simplicity.

Now, look at these two sample résumés and observe how the second one uses white space to tidy up the document and to attract the reader's attention to certain places. Which one do you think most employers would prefer to read?
