

Arkansas Population Projections: 2003 - 2025

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Executive Summary

This report presents population projections for the State of Arkansas, its 75 counties, 7 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 5 planning areas. Annual, county-level, intercensal population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Population Division are used to project each geographic area's population from 2003 through 2025. The projections are based on the most recent identifiable trend in each county's population growth or decay. In addition to the baseline projection, an interval estimate for the area's projected population is provided.

While the comprehensive report provides a great wealth of information, the following outcomes from the study are of particular note:

- Benton County will likely surpass Washington County as the second most populous county in Arkansas in 2003 and, if the baseline projections are realized, become the most populous county in Arkansas in 2025. The population of Benton County was 165,500 in 2002 and is projected to be between 220,488 and 231,561 in 2010 and between 382,009 and 422,270 in 2025.
- The population of Pulaski County, the state's most populous county in 2002 (364,381), is projected to be between 373,286 and 376,171 in 2010 and between 391,758 and 398,634 in 2025.
- The population of Washington County is projected to be between 191,703 and 205,603 in 2010 and between 255,736 and 299,689 in 2025. Calhoun County is projected to remain the least populous county in Arkansas through 2025.
- From 1969 to 2002, the state's population became increasingly concentrated in metropolitan areas. Based on the definitions in use prior to June 6, 2003, the proportion of the state's population living in an MSA was 44.5 percent in 1969 and 50.2 percent in 2002. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in an MSA will be 52.4 percent in 2010 and 57.0 percent in 2025.

- The proportion of the state's population living in the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA (as defined before June 6, 2003) is projected to increase from 22.0 percent in 2002 to 22.2 in 2010 and 22.3 percent in 2025.
- The proportion of the state's population living in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA (again, as defined before June 6, 2003) is projected to increase from 12.3 percent in 2002 to 14.5 percent in 2010 and 19.5 percent in 2025.
- The proportion of the state's population living in the Central Arkansas planning area is projected to increase from 29.3 percent in 2002 to 29.5 percent in 2025. If the baseline projections area realized, the area's population will exceed 1 million in 2023.
- The proportion living in the Northwest Arkansas planning area is projected to increase from 28.8 percent to 36.0 percent in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the Northwest Arkansas planning area will become the most populous planning area in Arkansas in 2004 and will have a population in excess of 1 million by 2015.
- The population living in the Northeast Arkansas planning area is projected to increase to more than 400,000 people by 2025, but its share of the state's population is projected to decline.
- The population of the Southwest Arkansas planning area is projected to increase to more than 450,000 people by 2018, but its share of the state's population is projected to decline.
- Population losses are projected to continue in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. In 2025, its population is projected to be close to 320,000.
- Finally, from 1969 to 2002, the population of the State of Arkansas increased by a net 797,079 people, or 41.7 percent, from 1,913,000 to 2,710,079. The state's population is projected to increase by 225,029 people, or 8.3 percent, to 2,935,108 by 2010 and by 768,969 people, or 28.4 percent, to 3,479,048 by 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the state's population will exceed 3 million in 2013.

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Introduction

The fundamental issue of economics is how to allocate a finite set of resources among a population with infinite desires. At the core of every economic decision are people who must decide what to produce, how to produce it, how much of it to produce, and when to produce it. People make these decisions by incorporating their beliefs or expectations about the future.

One of the most important aspects about the future that must be taken into consideration by decision-makers, both public and private, is the expected size of the future population. For example, will the future population of a school district be such that construction of an additional middle school is needed? Do the city's streets need to be widened? Will there be enough people to support a new retail establishment? Will the state's population be sufficient to support the labor needs of high-tech firms?

The first step in answering the above questions and ones like them is to project the number of people living within a certain geographic area over a period of time. The purpose of this report is to project the total population of each of Arkansas' 75 counties from 2003 to 2025. Forecasting is necessarily an imperfect enterprise, and as such, the report is meant as a guide to be used by businesses, governments, researchers, and the general public. Care has been taken to refrain from unnecessary technical language and to explain the required technical language in a manner that is likely understood by non-economists or statisticians.

The remainder of the report is structured as follows. Section 2 discusses the data and methodology used in the analysis. Section 3 presents population projections for the 75 counties of Arkansas for the period 2003 through 2025. Section 4 presents population projections for the counties and parishes bordering Arkansas. Section 5 presents population projections for the seven Metropolitan Statistical Areas containing counties in Arkansas. Section 6 presents population projections for the state in aggregate, and Section 7 summarizes and concludes the report.

Data and Methodology

Changes in an area's population can be attributed to three sets of events: births, deaths, and net migration. The mathematical relationship between population and these three events is intuitively obvious (see equation [1]).

$$Population_{t+1} = Population_t + Births_t - Deaths_t + Net Migration_t$$

An area's population next year equals the area's current population plus the number of births in the area during the year, minus the number deaths in the area during the year, plus the number of people migrating into the area during the year, and minus the number of people migrating out of the area during the year.

The natural and economic processes underlying these events are complicated, but two general methods have been devised to simplify the problem of projecting population levels. Each method has costs and benefits associated with it. The methods and their relative merits are discussed in turn below.

The first method is the cohort-component method. To conduct this sort of analysis, data are needed on the age and sex of each member of the population (cohort) in question at the point in time from which the projections are to be made. Then, using historical rates of birth and death for members of the different age groups, the population is projected into the future.

The second method uses recent, historical trends in an area's population growth (or decay) and projects the population by extrapolating these trends into the future. The extrapolation method nets out the effects of births, deaths, and migration in projecting population for the area in question.

The primary advantage to the cohort-component method is that the projections generated using this method are much more detailed, giving information about the age and sex of the cohort in the future. Clearly, this is highly desirable for those wanting demographic information for the projected population of the cohort. For example, this method would be most useful for those wanting to answer questions such as will the future population of a school district be such that construction of a new middle school is needed?

There are disadvantages associated with the cohort-component method, however. The primary disadvantage of using this method is the significant data requirements. Detailed demographic data are needed for the cohort in question. In addition, historical data are needed on fertility rates, mortality rates, and rates of migration in the area for which the population is to

be projected. Along these lines, it is important to note the caveat that the past is not necessarily indicative of the future; future birth rates, death rates, and rates of migration may differ significantly from those used to construct the population projections.

Second, detailed demographic data for counties are released infrequently (once every ten years by the U.S. Census Bureau). The annual population estimates made by the Census Bureau are only for the county's total population. Thus, refinement of the projections made using the cohort-component method is not generally feasible.

The advantages to using the extrapolation method over the cohort-component method focus on the much less stringent data requirements for the former. The extrapolation method requires a suitably "long" series of population estimates, generally at least five years of observations is needed. Again, the caveat that the past is not necessarily indicative of the future is needed; birth, death, and migration rates may change over time.

Second, because the Census Bureau publishes county-level population estimates on an annual basis, the population projections generated by this method can be revisited and refined frequently using the most recent available data. This is the primary reason for choosing the extrapolation method over the cohort-component method for this analysis.

The disadvantages of the extrapolation method are obvious. First, the projections generated by this method are only for the total population of the geographic region in question. The projections give no information about the changing demographic structure of the population.

Second, the point in time used to begin the extrapolation process is an educated guess made by the person doing the projecting. If the trend in population growth (or decay) is not well defined, radically different projections could be made by choosing one year over another as the starting point for the extrapolation process. In this sense, making forecasts or projections (population or otherwise) is as much an art as it is a science.

Finally, both methods are void of economic assumptions about future employment conditions. For example, all else equal, prolonged high rates of unemployment may induce people, particularly those who are unemployed, to migrate to areas where employment prospects are or are expected to be relatively better. A literary example of this is found in Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath*, in which the Joad family moves from Oklahoma, stricken by The Dust Bowl during The Great Depression, to what they believe to be a better life as fruit pickers in California.

Such assumptions about future employment conditions could easily be added to either methodology. However, projections generated by incorporating such assumptions would be more difficult to analyze and subject to harsh critique. For example, population growth (or decay) could drive employment growth (or decay), vice versa, or, the most likely case, each feeds the other. Therefore, for the sake of simplicity, assumptions about future employment conditions do not enter the analysis presented below.

For this analysis, the extrapolation methodology discussed above was used to project the population of the state of Arkansas, its 75 counties, and the 7 metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) containing counties in Arkansas. Intercensal, annual, county-level population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Population Division were used to project the population of the geographic areas in question from 2003 through 2025.

For each county, the population estimates for the period 1969 through 2002 were plotted and examined for the most recent identifiable trend in the county's population growth or decay. The year in which the trend began was selected to be the starting point for the extrapolation process. At least five years of data were used in the process to incorporate enough information about population movements to ensure more robust projections would result.

The caveat that the past is not necessarily indicative of the future certainly applies to the projections reported in this document. However, recent trends are often decent estimates of what will happen in the future. As such, the projections provided in this report are reasonable but should not be taken as gospel. They are an educated "best guess" about the future population levels of the geographic areas under consideration.

Even the best guesses and predictions necessarily have some degree of uncertainty associated with them. The population projections presented in this report are no different. Therefore, in addition to the baseline projection made for each county, a 95-percent prediction interval is also reported. This interval gives a lower and upper bound that the county's population level, as projected using the methodology outlined above, is projected to fall between with 95 percent confidence.

This is important because the interval gives decision-makers the ability to analyze different scenarios for which to plan. The intervals are especially useful when no clear recent trend in a county's population level is present. In cases where no clear trend is identifiable, the upper bound of the interval may suggest that a county's population may increase during the

forecast period, while the lower bound of the interval may suggest that the county's population
may decrease during the period.

Population Projections, Arkansas Counties

This section presents population projections for Arkansas' 75 counties for the period 2003 through 2025. Each county constitutes a sub-section of this portion of the report. The counties, shown by their geographic location in the state in Figure 1, are ordered alphabetically starting with Arkansas County and ending with Yell County.



The structure of the narrative for each county is as follows. Identifiable historical trends in the county's population level are discussed and are shown graphically. The baseline population projection is shown as a continuation of the historical population levels (in black on the graphic). The lower and upper bounds of the 95-percent prediction interval are shown on the same graphic as bright red and maroon lines, respectively.

In addition, a table is provided showing historical population estimates for the county for the period 1998 through 2002. The table also provides the baseline population projection, as well as the lower and upper bounds of the prediction interval, for the county for the years 2005, 2010, 2015, 2020, and 2025. In addition, for these five years, the table displays the absolute change and the percentage change in the county's population from the 2002 estimate for the baseline projection and for the upper and lower bounds of the prediction interval.

The reader may only be interested in the population projections for one specific county. However, it would behoove the reader to examine the projections for the counties surrounding the one in question to gain a better perspective of regional population trends. As such, for each county, a list of the surrounding counties, and the pages on which their population projections can be found, are provided.

Arkansas County

Arkansas County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Arkansas County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Stuttgart (9,745), DeWitt (3,552), and Gillett (819).¹

From 1972 to 1978, the population of Arkansas County increased by 1,255 people, or 5.4 percent, from 23,170 to 24,425.

From 1982 to 1989, the county's population decreased 10.0 percent to 21,705 (see Figure 2). From 1990 through 2002, the rate of population decline slowed. In 2002, the population of Arkansas County was 20,355, 6.1 percent less than in 1990. The county was the 37th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1990 to 2002 trend, the population of Arkansas County is projected to decrease by 611 people, or 3.0 percent, to 19,744 by 2010 and by 1,935 people, or 9.5 percent, to 18,420 by 2025 (see Table 1). The county's population is projected to be between 19,503 and 19,986 in 2010 and between 18,055 and 18,790 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Arkansas County will be the 39th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 46th most populous county in the state in 2025.



Ashley County

Ashley County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Ashley County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Crossett (6,097), Hamburg (3,039), North Crossett CDP ² (3,581), West Crossett CDP (1,664), and Wilmot (796).



From 1974 to 1978, the population of Ashley County increased by 1,468 people, or 5.8 percent, from 25,478 to 26,946. The population of Ashley County declined each year from 1978 to 1990, save in 1981, 1984, and 1985 (see Figure 3). For the period, the county's population declined by 2,663 people, or 9.9 percent. The rate of population decline slowed from 1990 to 2002, during which time the county's population decreased by 408 people, or 1.7 percent, from 24,283 to 23,875. The county was the 30th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1990 to 2002 data, the population of Ashley County is projected to decrease by 176 people, or 0.7 percent, to 23,699 by 2010 and by 835 people, or 3.5 percent, to 23,040 by 2025 (see Table 2). The county's population is projected to be between 23,202 and 24,209 in 2010 and between 22,257 and 23,854 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Ashley county will be the 32nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 33rd most populous county in the state in 2025.



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Baxter County

Baxter County is located in north-central Arkansas and is a component of the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Baxter County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Mountain Home (11,012), Gassville (1,706), Cotter (921), and Lakeview (763).



From 1969 to 1977, the population of Baxter County increased by 11,299 people, or 76.4 percent, from 14,798 to 26,097. The rate of population growth slowed from 1977 to 1990 (see Figure 4); population gains totaled 5,220 for the period. From 1991 through 1995, the county again experienced relatively strong population growth, during which time the county's population increased by 4,429 people, or 13.9 percent, to 36,313.

From 1995 through 2002, the rate of population growth in the county slowed. In 2002, the population of Baxter County was 38,672. The county was the 18th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Baxter County is projected to increase by 3,047 people, or 7.9 percent, to 41,719 by 2010 and by 8,905 people, or 23.0 percent, to 47,577 by 2025 (see Table 3). The county's population is projected to be between 40,599 and 42,869 in 2010 and between 44,999 and 50,297 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized,

Baxter County will be the 19th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 16th most populous county in the state in 2025.



Benton County

Benton County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. The county is a component of the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA. Population centers in Benton County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Rogers (38,829), Bentonville (19,730), Bella Vista CDP (16,582), Siloam Springs (10,843), and Lowell (5,013).



The growth of Benton County's population and growth in the economic activity taking place within the county during the last three decades is nothing short of remarkable. The county's population in 2002 (165,500) is roughly 3.4 times greater than in 1969 (49,171). This translates into an annual growth rate of approximately 3.8 percent. Year-on-year population growth in Benton County exceeded 850 people each year from 1969 through 2002.

Much of the growth in Benton County and in Washington County to the south can be directly attributed to the emergence of Wal-Mart, whose corporate headquarters are located in Bentonville, as the world's largest retailer and the world's largest private employer. Most impressive has been the population growth the county experienced from 1991 through 2002 (see Figure 5). In 1991, the county's population stood at 102,583; by 2002, the county's population had grown by 62,917 people, or roughly 4.4 percent per annum, to 165,500. During this period,

year-on-year population growth exceeded 4,700 people each year and in five of those years exceeded 6,100 people.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Benton County is projected to increase by 60,457 people, or 36.5 percent, to 225,957 by 2010 and by 236,135 people, or 142.7 percent, to 401,635 by 2025 (see Table 4). It is likely that Benton County will surpass Washington County as the second most populous county in Arkansas in 2003. Even more impressive, based on the baseline projections, Benton County will become the state's most populous county, ahead of Pulaski County, in 2025. The county's population is projected to be between 220,488 and 231,561 in 2010 and between 382,009 and 422,270 in 2025.



Boone County

Boone County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Boone County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Harrison (12,152), Diamond City (730), Bergman (407), and Bellafonte (400).




Figure 6: Boone County Historical Population and Population Projections

Boone County experienced relatively strong population growth from 1971 to 1980, during which time the county's

population increased by 6,863 people, or 35.6 percent, from 19,256 to 26,119. The rate of population growth slowed from 1981 through 1991 (see Figure 6); population gains for the period totaled 2,517 people. From 1991 to 1996, Boone County experienced relatively fast population growth. For the period, the population grew by 3,855 people, or 13.4 percent, from 28,788 to 32,643.

Since 1996, the population of the county has grown relatively slowly, increasing by 2,070 people, or 6.3 percent, to 34,713 people in 2002. The county was the 20th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Boone County is projected to increase by 3,092 people, or 8.9 percent, to 37,805 by 2010 and by 9,638 people, or 27.8 percent, to 44,351 by 2025 (see Table 5). The county's population is projected to be between 37,079 and 38,546 in 2010 and between 42,540 and 46,245 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized,

Boone County will be the 20th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 18th most populous county in the state in 2025.

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Bradley County

Bradley County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Bradley County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Warren (6,442), Hermitage (769), and Banks (120).




Figure 7: Bradley County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1971 to 1979, the population of Bradley County increased by 954 people, or 7.3 percent, from 13,082 to 14,036. The county then experienced 11 consecutive years of population declines totaling 2,228 people, or 15.9 percent, from 1979 to 1990 (see Figure 7). Although the population in the county declined by a total of 75 people in 2001 and 2002, since 1990, the population of Bradley County increased by a net 723 people. Bradley County, with a population of 12,531, was the 58th most populous

Based on the longer term trend from 1990 through 2002, the population of Bradley County is projected to increase by 724 people, or 5.8 percent, to 13,255 by 2010 and by 1,891 people, or 15.1 percent, to 14,422 by 2025 (see Table 6). The county's population is projected to be between 13,019 and 13,494 in 2010 and between 14,007 and 14,849 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Bradley County will be the 56th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 51st most populous in the state in 2025.

Calhoun County

Calhoun County is located in south-central Arkansas and is a component of the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Calhoun County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Hampton (1,579), Thornton (517), and Harrell (293).



From 1972 to 1975, the population of Calhoun County increased by 366 people, or 6.6 percent, from 5,540 to 5,906.

Roughly half of the population gain for those years was erased during 1976 and 1977. From 1977 to 1980, the county's population again increased by 366 people, or 6.4 percent, to 6,073. From 1980 to 1987, the population of Calhoun County ranged between 6,000 and 6,125.




Figure 8: Calhoun County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population then dropped by 266 people, or 3.7 percent, from 6,047 in 1987 to 5,821 in 1990. Since 1990, the population of Calhoun County has been trending downward, albeit at a slower rate than during the 1987 to 1990 period (see Figure 8). Calhoun County, with a population of 5,681, was the least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1990 to 2002 trend, the population of Calhoun County is projected to decrease by 64 people, or 1.1 percent, to 5,617 by 2010 and by 222 people, or 3.9 percent, to 5,459 by 2025 (see Table 7). The county's population is projected to be between 5,519 and 5,716 in 2010 and between 5,305 and 5,617 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Calhoun County will remain the least populous county in Arkansas through 2025.

Carroll County

Carroll County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Carroll County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Berryville (4,433), Green Forest (2,717), and Eureka Springs (2,278).




Figure 9: Carroll County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1973 to 1990, Carroll County experienced relatively modest population growth (see Figure 9), during which time the county's population increased by 4,935 people, or 35.7 percent, from 13,835 to 18,770. The county then experienced relatively strong population growth from 1990 to 1996. The population of the county grew by 5,300 people, or 28.2 percent, to 24,070 in 1996.

Year-on-year population growth decreased during the 1996 to 2002 period, ranging between 309 and 371 people per year. In 2002, the county's population was 26,166, an increase of 2,096 people, or 8.7 percent, from 1996. The county was the 25th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Carroll County is projected to increase by 3,080 people, or 11.8 percent, to 29,246 by 2010 and by 9,896 people, or 37.8 percent, to 36,062 by 2025 (see Table 8). The county's population is projected to be between 29,144 and 29,349 in 2010 and between 35,793 and 36,334 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Carroll County will be the 23rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 24th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Chicot County

Chicot County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Chicot County, and their population levels in 2000, include the cities of Dermott (3,292), Lake Village (2,823), and Eudora (2,819).



From 1969 to 1972, the population of Chicot County decreased by 1,081 people, or 5.9 percent, from 18,287 to 17,206.




Figure 10: Chicot County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population increased by 819 people in 1973 and remained relatively stable through 1982 (see Figure 10).

The population of Chicot County has decreased every year since 1982, save in 1992. From 1982 to 1991, the county's population decreased by 2,421 people, or 13.4 percent, from 18,032 to 15,611. From 1992 to 2002, the population of Chicot County decreased by 2,149 people, or 13.6 percent, from 15,772 to 13,623. The county was the 55th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1992 to 2002 trend, the population of Chicot County is projected to decrease by 1,485 people, or 10.9 percent, to 12,138 by 2010 and by 3,910, or 28.7 percent, to 9,713 by 2025 (see Table 9). The county's population is projected to be between 11,984 and 12,294 in 2010 and between 9,496 and 9,935 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Chicot County will be the 60th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 67th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Clark County

Clark County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Clark County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Arkadelphia (10,912), Gurdon (2,276), Amity (762), and Caddo Valley (563).



The population of Clark County spiked in 1975, increasing by 1,223 people, or 5.6 percent, from a base of 21,746 in 1974.




Figure 11: Clark County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1975 through 1979, the county experienced more modest population gains (see Figure 11). During the period, the county's population increased by 662 people, or 2.9 percent, to 23,631.

From 1979 to 1990, the population of Clark County decreased every year, save in 1983. For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 2,191 people, or 9.3 percent, to 21,440 in 1990. From 1990 to 2002, the population of the county has been trending upward. Since 1990, the county's population increased by a net 2,095 people, or 9.8 percent, to 23,535 in 2002. The county was the 31st most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1994 through 2002 trend, the population of Clark County is projected to increase by 592 people, or 2.5 percent, to 24,127 by 2010 and by 1,467 people, or 6.2 percent, to 25,002 by 2025 (see Table 10). The county's population is projected to be between 23,325 and 24,957 in 2010 and between 23,412 and 26,699 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Clark County will be the 31st most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Clay County

Clay County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Clay County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Piggott (3,894), Corning (3,679), and Rector (2,017).




Figure 12: Clay County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1976, the population of Clay County increased by 2,227 people, or 11.8 percent, from 18,928 to 21,155. The county's population was relatively stable from 1976 to 1979 (see Figure 12). Since 1979, however, the population of Clay County has decreased every year, save in 1996 and 1999.

From 1979 to 1990, the county's population declined by 3,069 people, or 14.5 percent, from 21,165 to 18,096. From 1990 through 2002, the rate of population decline slowed in Clay County. For the period, the population decreased by 969 people, or 5.4 percent to 17,127 people in 2002. The county was the 46th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1990 to 2002 trend, the population of Clay County is projected to decrease by 306 people, or 1.8 percent, to 16,821 by 2010 and by 1,284 people, or 7.5 percent, to 15,843 by 2025 (see Table 11). The county's population is projected to be between 16,465 and 17,183 in 2010 and between 15,301 and 16,403 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Clay County will be the 49th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 50th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Cleburne County

Cleburne County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Cleburne County, and their 2000 population levels, include Heber Springs (6,432), Greers Ferry (930), and Quitman (684 of the city's population of 714 in 2000 lived in Cleburne County).




Figure 13: Cleburne County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Cleburne County increased every year from 1969 through 2002, save in 1981 when the population decreased by a mere 6 people from a base of 16,916 in 1980 (see Figure 13). Moreover, except for 1981 and 1986, the county's population increased by at least 100 people each year. From 1969 to 1979, the county's population increased by 6,498 people, or 63.6 percent, from 10,216 to 16,714.

The rate of population growth decreased during the 1979 through 1993 period. From 1979 to 1988, the county's population increased by 2,240 people, or 13.4 percent, to 18,954 in 1988. From 1988 to 1993, the population of Cleburne County increased by 2,168, or 11.4 percent, to 21,122.

The county's population growth rate accelerated slightly during the 1993 to 2002 period. The county's population increased by 3,448 people, or 16.3 percent, to 24,570 in 2002. The county was the 29th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1993 to 2002 trend, the population of Cleburne County is projected to increase by 3,894 people, or 15.8 percent, to 28,464 by 2010 and by 12,169 people, or 49.5 percent, to 36,739 by 2025 (see Table 12). The county's population is projected to be between 27,604 and 29,352 in 2010 and between 34,711 and 38,886 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Cleburne County will be the 24th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 23rd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Cleveland County

Cleveland County is located in south-central Arkansas and is a component of the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Cleveland County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Rison (1,271) and Kingsland (449). Effective June 6, 2003, Cleveland County is a component of the Pine Bluff MSA.




Figure 14: Cleveland County Historical Population and Population Projections

After increasing by 851 people to 7,256 in 1972, the population of Cleveland County decreased by 222 people in 1973 and remained relatively stable until 1976 (see Figure 14). From 1976 to 1981, the county's population increased by 782 people, or 10.9 percent, to 7,947.

From 1981 to 1990, the county's population remained relatively stable, fluctuating between 7,750 and 8,000. From 1990 to 2002, the county's population increased by 777 people, or 10.0 percent to 8,541. The county was the 5th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1990 to 2002 trend, the population of Cleveland County is projected to increase by 875 people, or 10.2 percent, to 9,416 by 2010 and by 2,342 people, or 27.4 percent, to 10,883 by 2025 (see Table 13). The county's population is projected to be between 9,144 and 9,696 in 2010 and between 10,378 and 11,414 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Cleveland County will be the 66th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 65th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Columbia County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Columbia County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Magnolia (10,858), Waldo (1,594), McNeil (662), Taylor (566), and Emerson (359).




Figure 15: Columbia County Historical Population and Population Projections

After increasing by 759 people to 26,877 in 1971, the population of Columbia County decreased by 566 in 1972 and by 505 in 1973. From 1973 to 1983, the county's population increased by 1,213 people, or 4.7 percent, from 25,806 to 27,019. The population of Columbia County decreased each year from 1983 to 1990 (see Figure 15). Population declines for the period totaled 1,328 people, or 4.9 percent.

The county's population was relatively stable from 1990 to 1995. From 1995 to 2002, though, the population of Columbia County decreased by 631 people, or 2.4 percent, from 25,974 to 25,343. The county was the 27th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Columbia County is projected to decrease by 763 people, or 3.0 percent, to 24,580 by 2010 and by 2,139 people, or 8.4 percent, to 23,204 by 2025 (see Table 14). The county's population is projected to be between 24,164 and 25,002 in 2010 and between 22,409 and 24,026 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Columbia County will be the 29th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 32nd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Conway County

Conway County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Conway County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Morrilton (6,550), Plumerville (854), Oppelo (725), and Menifee (311).



From 1969 to 1976, the population of Conway County increased by 2,350 people, or 14.1 percent, from 16,621 to 18,971.




Figure 16: Conway County Historical Population and Population Projections

The rate of population growth from 1976 to 1980 was considerably lower (see Figure 16). For the period, the county's population grew by 508 people, or 2.7 percent, to 19,479. From 1980 to 1989, the county's population decreased by 350 people, or 1.8 percent, to 19,129.

After growing relatively slowly from 1989 to 1994, the population of Conway County increased by 616 people in 1994 and 1995 to 19,966. From 1995 through 2002, the rate of population growth again slowed. In 2002, the county's population was 20,411, 2.3 percent higher than in 1995. The county was the 36th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Conway County is projected to increase by 579 people, or 2.8 percent, to 20,990 by 2010 and by 1,613, or 7.9 percent, to 22,024 by 2025 (see Table 15). The county's population is projected to be between 20,646 and 21,337 in 2010 and between 21,297 and 22,777 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Conway County will be the 36th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and be the 35th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Craighead County

Craighead County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Craighead County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Jonesboro (55,515), Lake City (1,956), Bay (1,800), Bono (1,512), Caraway (1,349), Brookland (1,332), and Monette (1,179). Craighead County is a component of the Jonesboro MSA.



From 1969 to 1978, the county's population increased by 11,008 people, or 21.3 percent, from 51,733 to 62,741. Year-on-year population growth in Craighead County exceeded 475 people in each year of the period, exceeded 1,000 people in five years of the period, and exceeded 2,600 people in 1971.

From 1978 to 1986, the county's population increased by 1,557 people, or 2.5 percent. Year-on-year population growth in the county exceeded 1,000 people each year from 1986 to 1998, save in 1991. From 1986 to 1998, the county's population grew by 15,819 people, or 24.6 percent, to 80,117.




Figure 17: Craighead County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1998 to 2002, population growth slowed (see Figure 17). For the period, the county's population increased by 3,957 people, or 4.9 percent. Craighead County, with a population of 84,074, was the 8th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the county's population is projected to increase by 8,707 people, or 10.4 percent, to 92,781 by 2010 and by 27,272 people, or 32.4 percent to 111,346 by 2025 (see Table 16). The county's population is projected to be between 90,192 and 95,435 in 2010 and between 104,099 and 119,098 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the county will be the 8th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Crawford County

Crawford County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Crawford County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Van Buren (18,986), Alma (4,160), Mulberry (1,627), Cedarville (1,133), and Kibler (969). Crawford County is a component of the Fort Smith MSA.



Crawford County's population increased every year from




Figure 18: Crawford County Historical Population and Population Projections

1969 to 2002 (see Figure 18). Year-on-year gains exceeded 500 people each year, save in 1981 and 1982; exceeded 1,000 people 11 times; and exceeded 2,100 people in 1977. For the period, the county's population grew by 29,656 people, or 117.1 percent, from 25,317 to 54,973.

From 1969 to 1979, the county's population increased by 11,075 people, or 43.7 percent, to 36,392. From 1979 to 1992, the county's population increased by 8,157, or 22.4 percent, to 44,549. From 1992 to 1996, the county's population increased by 5,097 people, or 11.4 percent. In 2002, the county was the 13th most populous county in Arkansas, with a population of 54,973, 10.7 percent higher than in 1996.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Crawford County is projected to increase by 8,445 people, or 15.4 percent, to 63,418 by 2010 and by 27,415 people, or 49.9 percent, to 82,388 by 2025 (see Table 17). The county's population is projected to be between 61,951 and 64,926 in 2010 and between 78,339 and 86,656 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Crawford County will be the 12th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 11th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Crittenden County

Crittenden County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Crittenden County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of West Memphis (27,666), Marion (8,901), Earle (3,036), and Turrell (957). The county is a component of the Memphis MSA.




Figure 19: Crittenden County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1971 to 1973, the population of Crittenden County grew by 2,417 people, or 5.1 percent, from 47,169 to 49,586. From 1973 to 1978, though, the county's population declined by 1,348 people, or 2.7 percent, to 48,238. After increasing by 944 people in 1979, the rate of population growth declined from 1979 to 1989 (see Figure 19). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 875 people, or 1.7 percent, to 50,057.

After decreasing by a net 395 people to 49,662 from 1989 to 1996, the county's population increased steadily to 51,291 in 2001. Population estimates for 2002 show no increase in the county's population over its level in 2001. The county was the 14th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Crittenden County is projected to increase by 2,718 people, or 5.3 percent, to 54,009 by 2010 and by 7,822 people, or 15.3 percent, to 59,113 by 2025 (see Table 18). The county's population is projected to be between 53,221 and 54,803 in 2010 and between 57,280 and 61,004 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Crittenden County will be the 14th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Cross County

Cross County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Cross County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Wynne (8,615), Parkin (1,602), Cherry Valley (704), and Hickory Ridge (384).



From 1972 to 1975, the county's population grew by 1,187
people, or 6.1 percent, from 19,611 to 20,798. After declining
slightly in 1976, the county's population increased to an historical high of 21,006 in 1978 (see
Figure 20). The county's population declined by a net 1,797, or 8.6 percent, from 1978 to 1991.

After increasing slightly in 1992 and 1993, the county's population decreased by 216 people to an historic low of 19,112 in 1994. The population of Cross County then increased by 502 people to 19,614 in 1998. Since 1998, the county's population has decreased by a net 271 people to 19,343 in 2002. The county was the 39th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Cross County is projected to decrease by 407 people, or 2.1 percent, to 18,936 by 2010 and by 1,246 people, or 6.4 percent, to 18,097 by 2025 (see Table 19). The county's population is projected to be between 18,299 and 19,594 in 2010 and between 16,681 and 19,636 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Cross County will be the 41st most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 47th most populous county in the state in 2025.




Figure 20: Cross County Historical Population and Population Projections

Dallas County

Dallas County is located in south-central Arkansas and is a component of the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Dallas County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Fordyce (4,799), Sparkman (586), and Carthage (442).




Figure 21: Dallas County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Dallas County was relatively stable from 1969 to 1983 (see Figure 21). During this time, the county's population ranged between 10,377 (1974) and its historical high of 10,625 in 1979. In 1983, the

county's population was 10,518.

Dallas County experienced population declines each year from 1983 to 1990. For the period, the county's population decreased by 913 people, or 8.7 percent, to 9,605. From 1990 to

1995, the county's population remained relatively stable. Since then, the population of Dallas County has decreased by 875 people, or 9.1 percent, from 9,660 in 1995 to 8,785 in 2002. The county was the 7th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Dallas County is projected to decrease by 730 people, or 8.3 percent, to 8,055 by 2010 and by 2,080 people, or 23.7 percent, to 6,705 by 2025 (see Table 20). The county's population is projected to be between 7,799 and 8,319 in 2010 and between 6,277 and 7,162 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Dallas County will be the 4th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 5th least populous county in the state in 2025.

Desha County

Dehsa County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Desha County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Dumas (5,238), McGehee (4,570), Arkansas City (589), and Mitchellville (497).




Figure 22: Desha County Historical Population and Population Projections

After decreasing by a net 439 people, or 2.3 percent, from 1969 to 1974, the population of Desha County increased by 1,526

people, or 8.2 percent, from 18,531 in 1974 to an historical high of 20,057 in 1978. The county has experienced year-on-year population declines every year since then (see Figure 22). Population declines from 1978 through 2002 totaled 5,252 people, or 26.2 percent.

The rate of population decline was fairly moderate from 1979 to 1986 but increased from 1986 to 1988. From 1986 to 1988, the county's population decreased by 871 people, or 4.8 percent, from 18,215 to 17,344. The rate of population decrease moderated from 1988 to 1996, during which time the county's population decreased by 1,544 people, or 8.9 percent, to 15,800. From 1996 to 2002, the county's population decreased by 995 people, or 6.3 percent, to 14,805. The county was the 51st most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Desha County is projected to decrease by 1,076 people, or 7.3 percent, to 13,729 by 2010 and by 3,025 people, or 20.4 percent, to 11,780 by 2025 (see Table 21). The county's population is projected to be between 13,356 and 14,114 in 2010 and between 11,102 and 12,501 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Desha County will be the 54th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 61st most populous county in the state in 2025.

Drew County

Drew County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Drew County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Monticello (9,146), Wilmar (571), Tillar (207 of the city's 240 residents in 2000 lived in Drew County), and Winchester (191).




Figure 23: Drew County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1971 to 1979, the county's population increased by 3,090 people, or 20.5 percent, from 15,072 to 18,162. From 1979 to 1992, the population of the county trended downward, although the rate of population decrease was relatively low (see Figure 23). In 1992, the population of the county was 17,469, 3.8 percent less than in 1979.

Since 1992, the county's population has increased by 1,170 people, or 6.7 percent. The population of Drew County reached an historical high in 2001, when it stood at 18,759. In 2002, though, the county's population decreased by 120 to 18,639. The county was the 40th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1992 to 2002 trend, the population of Drew County is projected to increase by 1,234 people, or 6.6 percent, to 19,873 by 2010 and by 3,157, or 16.9 percent, to 21,796 by 2025 (see Table 22). The county's population is projected to be between 19,113 and 20,661 in 2010 and between 20,345 and 23,351 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Drew County will be the 38th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 37th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Faulkner County

Faulkner County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Faulkner County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Conway (43,167), Greenbrier (3,042), Vilonia (2,106), and Mayflower (1,631). Faulkner County is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.




Figure 24: Faulkner County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population increased every year from 1969 to 2002 (see Figure 24), growing by 58,908 people, or 192.0 percent, from 30,682 in 1969 to 89,590 in 2002. Year-on-year population growth exceeded 1,000 people each year, save in 1975, 1981 and 1982; exceeded 2,000 people 11 times; and exceeded 3,000 people in 1996 and 1997.

From 1969 to 1980, the county's population increased by 15,664 people, or 51.1 percent, to 46,346. Population growth moderated in 1981 and 1982. From 1982 to 1991, the county's population increased by 15,014, or 31.7 percent, from 47,338 to 62,652.

Population growth accelerated from 1991 to 1997, during which time the county's population increased by 17,372 people, or 27.9 percent, to 79,724. Population growth moderated slightly thereafter. From 1997 to 2002, the county's population grew by 9,866 people, or 12.4 percent. Faulkner County was the 6th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 89,590.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Faulkner County is projected to increase by 19,551 people, or 21.8 percent, to 109,141 by 2010 and by 66,283 people, or 74.0 percent, to 155,873 by 2025 (see Table 23). The county's population is projected to be between 104,068 and 114,451 in 2010 and between 139,958 and 173,581 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Faulkner County will be the 5th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 4th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Franklin County

Franklin County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Franklin County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Ozark (3,525), Charleston (2,965), Altus (817), Branch (357), and Denning (270). Effective June 6, 2003, Franklin County is a component of the Fort Smith MSA.




Figure 25: Franklin County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1979, the population of Franklin County increased by 3,426 people, or 30.5 percent, from 11,220 to 14,646. From 1979 to 1990, the county's population ranged between 14,600 and 15,100. Population growth in Franklin County accelerated from 1990 to 1996 (see Figure 25). The county's population stood at 17,077 in 1996, a 14.3 percent increase from the county's population of 14,939 in 1990.

Population growth in the county decreased during the 1996 through 2002 period. The population of Franklin County experienced a net increase of 791 people, or 4.6 percent, for the period. Franklin County was the 42nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 17,868.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Franklin County is projected to increase by 1,182 people, or 6.6 percent, to 19,050 by 2010 and by 3,320 people, or 18.6 percent, to 21,188 by 2025 (see Table 24). The county's population is projected to be between 18,068 and 20,086 in 2010 and between 18,909 and 23,744 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Franklin County will be the 40th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and in 2025.

Fulton County

Fulton County is located in north-central Arkansas and is a component of the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Fulton County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Salem (1,591), Mammoth Spring (1,147), and Cherokee Village (809 of the city's population of 4,648 in 2000 lived in Fulton County).




Figure 26: Fulton County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1976, the population of Fulton County increased by 2,181 people, or 28.7 percent, from 7,588 to 9,769. From 1976 to 1992, the county's population ranged between 9,750 and 10,125 (see Figure 26). In 1992, the population of Fulton County stood at 10,113, a 3.5 percent increase from 1976. Population growth accelerated from 1992 to 1995, with year-on-year population gains exceeding 225 people each year. For the period, the county's population increased by 784 people, or 7.8 percent, to 10,897.

From 1995 to 2002, population growth slow, and the county's population decreased by 135 people from 2000 to 2002. For the 1995 through 2002 period, though, the county's population grew by a net 630 people, or 5.8 percent. Fulton County was the 60th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 11,527.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Fulton County is projected to increase by 1,018 people, or 8.8 percent, to 12,545 by 2010 and by 2,747 people, or 23.8 percent, to 14,274 by 2025 (see Table 25). The county's population is projected to be between 11,856 and 13,276 in 2010 and between 12,716 and 16,023 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Fulton County will be the 58th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 52nd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Garland County

Garland County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Garland County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Hot Springs (35,750), Hot Springs Village CDP (6,656 of the CDP's 8,397 population in 2000 lived in Garland County), Piney CDP (3,988), Rockwell CDP (3,024), and Lake Hamilton CDP (1,609).




Figure 27: Garland County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1980, the county's population increased by 17,010 people, or 31.8 percent, from 53,535 to 70,545. Population growth moderated from 1980 to 1990, during which time the county's population increased by a net 3,018 people, or 4.3 percent, to 73,563. From 1990 to 1994, the county's population growth increased at an increasing rate (see Figure 27). For the period, the population of Garland County increased by 7,110 people, or 9.7 percent, to 80,673.

Population growth in Garland County slowed from 1994 through 2002. For the period, the county's population grew by 9,386 people, or 11.6 percent, to 90,059. The county was the 5th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1994 to 2002 trend, the population of Garland County is projected to increase by 11,146 people, or 12.4 percent, to 101,205 by 2010 and by 34,421 people, or 38.2 percent, to 124,480 by 2025 (see Table 26). The county's population is projected to be between 99,092 and 103,363 in 2010 and between 119,479 and 129,690 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Garland County will be the 6th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 7th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Grant County

Grant County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Grant County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Sheridan (3,872), Leola (515), and Tull (358). Effective June 6, 2003, Grant County is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.



Grant County's population increased every year from 1969 to 2002, save in 1981 and 1982. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 7,249 people, or 75.5 percent, from 9,599 to 16,848. This translates to an average growth rate of 1.7 percent per annum.




Figure 28: Grant County Historical Population and Population Projections

Population growth was relatively strong from 1969 to 1978 (see Figure 28), during which time the county's population increased by 3,180 people, or 33.1 percent, to 12,779 in 1978. From 1978 to 1985, population growth slowed, increasing by a net 352 people, or 2.8 percent, to 13,131. Population growth increased from 1985 to 1991, during which time the county's population increased by 989 people, or 7.5 percent. Population growth accelerated from 1991 to 1997, during which time the county's population grew by 1,785 people, or 12.6 percent, to 15,905.

The rate of population growth has moderated since 1997. From 1997 to 2002, the county's population increased by 943 people, or 5.9 percent. Grant County was the 47th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 16,848.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Grant County is projected to increase by 1,711 people, or 10.2 percent, to 18,559 by 2010 and by 5,278 people, or 31.3 percent, to 22,126 by 2025 (see Table 27). The county's population is projected to be between 18,222 and 18,900 in 2010 and between 21,231 and 23,061 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Grant County will be the 44th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 34th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Greene County

Greene County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Greene County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Paragould (22,017), Marmaduke (1,158), Oak Grove Heights (727), and Lafe (385).



The population of Greene County increased every year from 1969 to 2002, save in 1980, 1981, and 1987. For the period, the population of Greene County increased by 13,211 people, or 53.2 percent, from 24,827 to 38,038. This translates to an average growth rate of 1.3 percent per annum.




Figure 29: Greene County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1979, the population of Greene County increased by 6,332 people, or 25.5 percent, to 31,159 and remained relatively stable until 1988 (see Figure 29). From 1988 to 1995, population growth totaled 3,451, or 11.0 percent.

From 1995 to 2002, population growth in Greene County moderated slightly; the county's population increased by 3,186 people, or 9.1 percent, from 34,852 to 38,038. The county was the 19th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Greene County is projected to increase by 4,413 people, or 11.6 percent, to 42,451 by 2010 and by 13,501 people, or 35.5 percent, to 51,539 by 2025 (see Table 28). The county's population is projected to be between 41,569 and 43,356 in 2010 and between 49,365 and 53,809 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Greene County will be the 18th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 15th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Hempstead County

Hempstead County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Hempstead County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Hope (10,616), Blevins (365), Perrytown (255), Fulton (245), and Washington (148).




Figure 30: Hempstead County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1980, the county experienced relatively strong population growth. For the period, the county's population increased by 4,213 people, or 21.7 percent, from 19,378 to 23,591. The county's population declined every year from 1980 to 1989 (see Figure 30), decreasing by 1,943 people, or 8.2 percent, to 21,648. From 1989 to 1993, the county's population increased by 986 people, or 4.6 percent, to 22,634 in 1993.

From 1994 through 2002, population growth in the county moderated. The population of Hempstead County increased by a net 900 people, or 4.0 percent, for the period. In 2002, the population of the county stood at 23,492, 99 people less than the county's historical high in 1980. The county was the 32nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1994 to 2002 trend, the population of Hempstead County is projected to increase by 1,231 people, or 5.2 percent, to 24,723 by 2010 and by 3,296 people, or 14.0 percent, to 26,788 by 2025 (see Table 29). The county's population is projected to be between 24,082 and 25,382 in 2010 and between 25,456 and 28,192 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Hempstead County will be the 28th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 25th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Hot Spring County

Hot Spring County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Hot Spring County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Malvern (9,021), Rockport (792), Donaldson (326), Friendship (206), and Perla (115).



From 1971 to 1979, Hot Spring County experienced relatively strong population growth. For the period, the county's population increased by 4,693 people, or 21.3 percent, from 21,984 to 26,677. From 1979 to 1987, the population of Hot Spring County remained relatively stable, ranging from 26,415 to 26,902.




Figure 31: Hot Spring County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population decreased three years in a row during 1988 through 1990 (see Figure 31). The population of Hot Spring County decreased by 780 people, or 2.9 percent, from 26,902 in 1987 to 26,122 in 1990. Since 1990, the county has experienced year-on-year population growth each year. The county's population grew by 2,882 people, or 11.0 percent, from 26,122 in 1990 to 29,004 in 1996.

Since 1996, the rate of population growth in Hot Spring County has moderated. From 1996 to 2002, the county's population increased by 1,554 people, or 5.4 percent, to 30,558. The county was the 22nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Hot Spring County is projected to increase by 2,483 people, or 8.1 percent, to 33,041 by 2010 and by 7,217 people, or 23.6 percent, to 37,775 by 2025 (see Table 30). The county's population is projected to be between 31,968 and 34,149 in 2010 and between 35,186 and 40,550 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Hot Spring County will be the 22nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Howard County

Howard County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Howard County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Nashville (4,878), Mineral Springs (1,264), Dierks (1,230), and Tollette (324).




Figure 32: Howard County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1972, the county's population increased by 1,441 people, or 12.7 percent, from 11,380 to 12,821. Population

growth in Howard County moderated from 1972 to 1976 (see Figure 32), during which time the county's population increased by 165 people to 12,986. From 1976 to 1984, the county's population increased by a net 730 people, or 5.6 percent, to 13,716 in 1984. From 1984 to 1990, the county's population trended downward (albeit very slightly), decreasing by 122 people to 13,594 in 1990.

From 1990 to 1996, the county's population increased by 815 people, or 6.0 percent. The county's population reached an historic high of 14,409 in 1996. Modest population increases in 1998, 1999, and 2001 were offset by historically large decreases in 1997 and 2000 and a moderate decrease in 2002. The county was the 53rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 14,251.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Howard County is projected to decrease by 154 people, or 1.1 percent, to 14,097 by 2010 and by 449 people, or 3.2 percent, to 13,802 by 2025 (see Table 31). The county's population is projected to be between 13,862 and 14,337 in 2010 and between 13,312 and 14,313 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Howard County will be the 53rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 56th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Independence County

Independence County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Batesville (9,445), Newark (1,219), Cushman (461), and Sulphur Rock (421).




Figure 33: Independence County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1972, the county's population increased by 2,004 people, or 8.9 percent, from 22,500 to 24,504. Population growth in the county moderated from 1972 to 1975 (see Figure 33). Year-on-year population gains exceeded 1,000 people four times from 1975 to 1980, during which time the county's population increased by 5,469 people, or 22.0 percent, to 30,285.

From 1980 to 1983, the county's population increased by 1,370 people, or 4.5 percent, to 31,655. From 1983 to 1990, the county's population decreased by a net 479 people, or 1.5 percent. From 1990 to 1997, the county's population increased by a net 2,129 people, or 6.8 percent, from 31,176 to 33,305.

Population growth moderated from 1997 to 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by 1,126 people, or 3.4 percent, to 34,431. The county was the 21st most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Independence County is projected to increase by 2,136 people, or 6.2 percent, to 36,567 by 2010 and by 6,148 people, or 17.9 percent, to 40,579 by 2025 (see Table 32). The county's population is projected to be between 35,465 and 37,703 in 2010 and between 37,862 and 43,491 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Independence County will be the 21st most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Izard County

Izard County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Izard County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Horseshoe Bend (2,266 of the city's 2,278 residents in 2000 lived in Izard County), Melbourne (1,673), Calico Rock (991), Oxford (642), Mount Pleasant (401), Pineville (246), and Franklin (184).




Figure 34: Izard County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1980, the county experienced relatively strong population growth (see Figure 34). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 3,440 people, or 46.9 percent, from 7,334 to 10,774. Population growth moderated from 1980 to 1988, during which time the county's population increased by a net 293 people to 11,067.

Population growth in Izard County accelerated from 1988 to 1997. For the period, the county's population increased by 2,008 people, or 18.1 percent, to 13,075. Since 1997, population growth has moderated, and the county's population declined by a total of 85 people in 2001 and 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 117 people to 13,192. The county was the 57th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Izard County is projected to increase by 303 people, or 2.3 percent, to 13,495 by 2010 and by 769 people, or 5.8 percent, to 13,961 by 2025 (see Table 33). The county's population is projected to be between 13,070 and 13,933 in 2010 and between 12,984 and 15,009 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Izard County will be the 55th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Jackson County

Jackson County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Jackson County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Newport (7,811), Tuckerman (1,757), Diaz (1,284), Swifton (871), and Grubbs (438).




Figure 35: Jackson County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1972, the county's population grew by 1,106 people, or 5.4 percent, from 20,615 to 21,721. Population growth

slowed from 1972 to 1974 (see Figure 35), during which time the county's population increased by 206 people. After decreasing in 1975, the county's population reached an historic high of 22,032 in 1976. The county's population has decreased every year since 1976, save 1991, 1993, and 1998. From 1976 to 1983, the county's population decreased by 922 people, or 4.2 percent, to 21,110.

From 1983 to 1987, the county's population decreased by 1,728 people, or 8.2 percent, to 19,382. The rate of population loss slowed from 1987 to 1994 but then accelerated from 1994 to 1997. The county's population fell by 937 people, or 5.0 percent, from 18,843 in 1994 to 17,906 in 1997.

After increasing by 1,027 people to 18,933 in 1998, the county's population resumed its decline through 2002. From 1998 to 2002, the county's population decreased by 1,131 people, or 6.0 percent. The county was the 43rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 17,802, an historic low for the county.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Jackson County is projected to decrease by 2,230 people, or 12.5 percent, to 15,572 by 2010 and by 5,595, or 31.4 percent, to 12,207 by 2025 (see Table 34). The county's population is projected to be between 14,828 and 16,354 in 2010 and between 10,863 and 13,718 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Jackson County will be the 51st most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 60th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Jefferson County

Jefferson County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Jefferson County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Pine Bluff (55,085), White Hall (4,732), Altheimer (1,192), and Redfield (1,157). The county is a component of the Pine Bluff MSA.




Figure 36: Jefferson County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population was relatively stable from 1969 to 1975 (see Figure 36) and then increased by 5,865 people, or 6.9 percent, from 84,857 in 1975 to an historic high of 90,722 in 1980. The county's population has decreased in 17 of the 22 years since 1980, with a net population loss of 7,348 people. From 1981 to 1986, the county's population declined by 3,075 people, or 3.4 percent, from 90,542 to 87,467. From 1987 to 1990, the county's population fell by 2,052 people, or 2.3 percent, from 87,525 to 85,473.

From 1990 to 1994, the county's population increased by a net 236 people. Population losses resumed in 1995 and continued through 2002, save in 2000. From 1994 to 2002, the county's population fell by a net 2,335 people, or 2.7 percent, from 85,709 to 83,374. The county was the 9th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1994 to 2002 trend, the population of Jefferson County is projected to decrease by 2,050 people, or 2.5 percent, to 81,324 by 2010 and by 5,962 people, or 7.2 percent, to 77,412 by 2025 (see Table 35). The county's population is projected to be between 80,870 and 81,773 in 2010 and between 76,573 and 78,253 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Jefferson County will be the 9th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 12th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Johnson County

Johnson County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Johnson County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Clarksville (7,719), Lamar (1,415), Coal Hill (1,001), Hartman (596), and Knoxville (511).




Figure 37: Johnson County Historical Population and Population Projections

Johnson County experienced year-on-year population growth in 29 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. The county experienced relatively strong population growth from 1970 to 1978 (see Figure 37). During the period, the county's population increased by a net 3,786 people, or 27.6 percent, from 13,693 in 1970 to 17,479 in 1978.

From 1978 to 1990, population growth in Johnson County was relatively modest. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 826 people, to 18,305. Population growth accelerated during the 1990 to 1998 period, during which time the county's population increased by 4,268 people, or 23.3 percent, from 18,305 to 22,573.

From 1998 to 2002, the county's population increased by 575 people, or 2.5 percent. The county was the 33rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 23,148 people, an historic high.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Johnson County is projected to increase by 1,129 people, or 4.9 percent, to 24,277 by 2010 and by 3,495 people, or 15.1 percent, to 26,643 by 2025 (see Table 36). The county's population is projected to be between 23,790 and 24,775 in 2010 and between 25,382 and 27,965 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Johnson County will be the 30th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 26th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Lafayette County

Lafayette County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Lafayette County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Stamps (2,131), Lewisville (1,285), Bradley (563), and Buckner (396).



From 1969 to 1972, the county's population decreased by a net 397 people, or 3.9 percent, from 10,119 to 9,722. The county's population then increased by a net 628 people to its historical high of 10,350 in 1978. From 1978 to 1982, the county's population decreased by 219 people to 10,131.




Figure 38: Lafayette County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced year-on-year population declines in 15 of the 18 years since 1984 (see Figure 38). From 1984 to 2002, the county's population decreased by a net 1,914 people, or 18.6 percent. From 1984 to 1995, the population of county's population decreased by a net 1,130 people, or 11.0 percent, from 10,296 to 9,166. The rate of population loss accelerated from 1995 to 2002, during which time the county's population decreased by 784 people, or 8.6 percent. The county was the 3rd least populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 8,382.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Lafayette County is projected to decrease by 919 people, or 11.0 percent, to 7,463 by 2010 and by 2,305 people, or 27.5 percent, to 6,077 by 2025 (see Table 37). The county's population is projected to be between 7,304 and 7,626 in 2010 and between 5,816 and 6,351 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Lafayette County will be the 2nd least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Lawrence County

Lawrence County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Lawrence County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Walnut Ridge (4,925), Hoxie (2,817), Black Rock (717), Imboden (684), and Ravenden (511).




Figure 39: Lawrence County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1976, the county's population increased by 2,053 people, or 12.5 percent, from 16,407 to 18,460. The county's population decreased by a net 225 people from 1976 to 1979 and then increased by 372 people to an historical high of 18,607 in 1981. The county's population then decreased for 11 consecutive years from 1981 to 1992 (see Figure 39). For the period, the county's population decreased by 1,106 people, or 5.9 percent, to 17,501.

From 1992 to 1997, the county experienced modest population growth. For the period, the county's population increased by 423 people, or 2.4 percent, to 17,924. Since 1997, the county's population has decreased by a net 337 people. The county was the 44th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 17,587.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Lawrence County is projected to decrease by 481 people, or 2.7 percent, to 17,106 by 2010 and by 1,406 people, or 8.0 percent, to 16,181 by 2025 (see Table 38). The county's population is projected to be between 16,339 and 17,912 in 2010 and between 14,583 and 17,956 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Lawrence County will be the 48th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 49th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Lee County

Lee County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Lee County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Marianna (5,181), Moro (241), Rondo (237), Aubrey (221), Haynes (214), and La Grange (122).




Figure 40: Lee County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Lee County decreased in 27 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 40). For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 6,909 people, or 36.1 percent, from 19,126 in 1969 to 12,217 in 2002. This translates to an average growth rate of negative 1.3 percent per annum.

From 1969 to 1974, the county's population decreased by 2,370 people, or 12.4 percent, to 16,756. After increasing by 314 people in 1975, Lee County's population decreased by 1,523 people, or 8.9 percent from 1975 to 1980. In 1980, the county's population stood at 15,547 people.

The rate of population loss slowed during the 1981 to 1992 period, during which the county's population declined by 2,746 people, or 17.7 percent, from 15,550 to 12,804. Despite three years of modest population gains from 1996 to 1999, the population of Lee County has been generally decreasing since 1993. For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 807 people, or 6.2 percent, from 13,024 in 1993 to 12,217 in 2002. The county was the 59th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1993 to 2002 trend, the population of Lee County is projected to decrease by 366 people, or 3.0 percent, to 11,851 by 2010 and by 1,209 people, or 9.9 percent, to 11,008 by 2025 (see Table 39). The county's population is projected to be between 11,320 and 12,408 in 2010 and between 10,111 and 11,984 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Lee County will be the 61st most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 64th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Lincoln County

Lincoln County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Lincoln County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Star City (2,471), Gould (1,305), and Grady (523). Effective June 6, 2003, the county is a component of the Pine Bluff MSA.




Figure 41: Lincoln County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Lincoln County decreased by 653 people, or 5.0 percent from 13,056 in 1969 to an historic low of 12,403 in 1973 (see Figure 41). From 1973 to 1975, the county's population increased by 888 people, or 7.2 percent, to 13,291. The county's population ranged from 12,995 to 13,394 between 1976 and 1986.

From 1986 to 1988, the county's population increased by 543 people, or 4.2 percent. From 1988 to 1997, the county's population increased by 881 people, or 6.5 percent, from 13,538 to 14,419.

The trend in population growth is less clear in the 1997 to 2002 period than in previous years. The county's population decreased by 36 people in 1998; increased by 91, 6, and 4 people in 1999, 2000, and 2001, respectively; and decreased by 237 people in 2002. The county was the 54th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 14,247.

Based on the 1997 through 2002 trend, the population of Lincoln County is projected to increase by 1 person to 14,248 by 2010 and decrease by 232 people, or 1.6 percent, to 14,015 by 2025 (see Table 40). The county's population is projected to be between 13,540 and 14,994 in 2010 and between 12,485 and 15,731 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Lincoln County will be the 52nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 53rd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Little River County

Little River County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Little River County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Ashdown (4,781), Foreman (1,125), Wilton (439), Ogden (214), and Winthrop (186).




Figure 42: Little River County Historical Population and Population Projections

Little River County experienced relatively strong population growth from 1969 to 1979 (see Figure 42). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 3,514 people, or 31.9 percent, from 11,021 in 1969 to an historic high of 14,535 in 1979. This translates to an average growth rate of 2.8 percent per annum.

After decreasing by 563 people in 1980, the population of Little River County ranged from 13,856 to 14,021 during the 1981 to 1990 period. From 1990 to 2002, the county's population decreased by a net 528 people, or 3.8 percent, from 14,002 to 13,474. The county was the 56th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1992 to 2002 trend, the population of Little River County is projected to decrease by 239 people, or 1.8 percent, to 13,235 by 2010 and by 674 people, or 5.0 percent, to 12,800 by 2025 (see Table 41). The county's population is projected to be between 13,076 and 13,397 in 2010 and between 12,528 and 13,078 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Little River County will be the 57th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 59th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Logan County

Logan County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Logan County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Booneville (4,117), Paris (3,707), Magazine (915), Subiaco (439), Caulksville (233), and Scranton (222).




Figure 43: Logan County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced relatively strong population growth from 1970 to 1978 (see Figure 43). For the period, the county's population increased by 3,161 people, or 18.8 percent, from 16,821 to 19,982. The county experienced moderate population growth from 1978 to 1985. During the period, the population of Logan County increased by a net 753 people, or 3.8 percent, to 20,735. The county's population then declined for four consecutive years from 1985 to 1989; population losses totaled 192.

The county experienced year-on-year population growth each year from 1989 to 2002, save in 2001. Population growth was relatively strong from 1991 to 1996; for the period, the county's population increased by 1,173 people, or 5.7 percent, from 20,655 to 21,828. Population growth moderated during the 1996 to 2002 period. The county's population increased by a net 566 people, or 2.6 percent, from 21,828 in 1996 to 22,394 in 2002. The county was the 34th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Logan County is projected to increase by 1,016, or 4.5 percent, to 23,410 by 2010 and by 2,793, or 12.5 percent, to 25,187 by 2025 (see Table 42). The county's population is projected to be between 22,688 and 24,154 in 2010 and between 23,548 and 26,941 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Logan County will be the 33rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 29th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Lonoke County

Lonoke County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Lonoke County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Cabot (15,261), Lonoke (4,287), England (2,972), Ward (2,580), and Carlisle (2,304). The county is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.




Figure 44: Lonoke County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population increased every year from 1969 to 2002 (see Figure 44). For the period, the county's population increased by 29,155 people, or 111.5 percent, from 26,147 to 55,302. This translates to an average growth rate of 2.3 percent per annum. From 1969 to 1978, the county's population increased by 7,503 people, or 28.7 percent, from 26,147 to 33,650. From 1978 to 1991, the county's population increased by 6,241 people, or 18.5 percent, to 39,891.

From 1991 to 1997, the county's population increased by 9,616 people, or 24.1 percent. From 1997 to 2002, population growth moderated. For the period, the county's population grew by 5,795 people, or 11.7 percent, from 49,507 in 1997 to 55,302 in 2002. The county was the 11th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Lonoke County is projected to increase by 11,088 people, or 20.0 percent, to 66,390 by 2010 and by 37,954, or 68.6 percent, to 93,256 by 2025 (see Table 43). The county's population is projected to be between 64,757 and 68,057 in 2010 and between 88,150 and 98,657 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Lonoke County will be the 11th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 10th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Madison County

Madison County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Madison County, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Huntsville (1,931) and the towns of St. Paul (163) and Hindsville (75). Effective June 6, 2003, the county is a component of the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA.




Figure 45: Madison County Historical Population and Population Projections

Madison County experienced relatively moderate population growth from 1969 to 1974 (see Figure 45). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 350 people, or 3.7 percent, from 9,418 to 9,768. From 1974 to 1980, the county's population grew by 1,602 people, or 16.4 percent, to 11,370 in 1980.

Population growth decelerated during the 1980 to 1990 period. In 1990, the county's population stood at 11,654, a net increase of 284 people, or 2.5 percent, from the county's population in 1980. From 1990 to 1994, the county's population increased by 1,603 people, or 13.8 percent, to 13,257 in 1994. From 1995 to 2002, the county's population grew by a net 1,082 people, or 8.2 percent, from 13,263 to 14,345. The county was the 52nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Madison County is projected to increase by 1,678 people, or 11.7 percent, to 16,023 by 2010 and by 4,963 people, or 34.6 percent, to 19,308 by 2025 (see Table 44). The county's population is projected to be between 15,489 and 16,577 in 2010 and between 18,014 and 20,694 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Madison County will be the 50th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 44th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Marion County

Marion County is located in north-central Arkansas and is in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Marion County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Bull Shoals (2,000), Flippin (1,357), Yellville (1,312), Summit (586), and the town of Pyatt (253).




Figure 46: Marion County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced year-on-year population growth in 29 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 46). For the period, the county's population grew by a net 9,337 people, or 134.9 percent (or 2.7 percent per annum), from 6,922 to 16,259.

From 1969 to 1978, the county's population increased by 4,276 people, or 61.8 percent, from 6,922 to 11,198. Population growth decelerated from 1978 to 1991. For the period, the county's population grew by a net 1,060 people, or 9.5 percent, to 12,258.

From 1991 to 1998, the county's population increased by 3,559 people, or 29.0 percent, to 15,817. Since 1998, population growth in Marion County has slowed, and in 2002, the county's population decreased by 57 people. From 1998 to 2002, the county's population increased by a net 442 people, or 2.8 percent, to 16,259. The county was the 49th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Marion County is projected to increase by 1,144 people, or 7.0 percent, to 17,403 by 2010 and by 3,296 people, or 20.3 percent, to 19,555 by 2025 (see Table 45). The county's population is projected to be between 16,421 and 18,446 in 2010 and between 17,023 and 22,465 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Marion County will be the 45th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 42nd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Miller County

Miller County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Miller County, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Texarkana (26,448) and the towns of Fouke (814) and Garland (352). The county is a component of the Texarkana MSA.




Figure 47: Miller County Historical Population and Population Projections

Miller County experienced year-on-year population growth in 29 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 47). For the period, the county's population grew by a net 7,846 people, or 23.6 percent, from 33,287 to 41,133. From 1969 to 1976, the county's population increased by 3,315 people, or 10.0 percent, from 33,287 to 36,602.

After decreasing by 159 people in 1977 and 1978, the county's population increased by 2,614 people, or 7.2 percent, from 36,443 in 1978 to 39,002 in 1983. From 1983 to 1990, the county's population decreased by a net 499 people, or 1.3 percent to 38,503.

The population of Miller County has increased every year since 1990. From 1992 to 1997, the county's population increased by 1,534 people, or 4.0 percent, from 38,759 to 40,293. In 2002, the county's population was 41,133, 840 people, or 2.1 percent, higher than in 1997. The county was the 17th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1992 to 2002 trend, the population of Miller County is projected to increase by 1,796 people, or 4.4 percent, to 42,929 by 2010 and by 5,427 people, or 13.2 percent, to 46,560 by 2025 (see Table 46). The county's population is projected to be between 42,332 and 43,530 in 2010 and between 45,424 and 47,724 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Miller County will be the 17th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Mississippi County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Mississippi County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Blytheville (18,272), Osceola (8,875), Gosnell (3,968), Leachville (1,981), and the town of Luxora (1,317).




Figure 48: Mississippi County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced year-on-year population declines in 25 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 48). For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 12,632 people, or 20.0 percent, from its historic high of 63,012 to 50,380. From 1969 to 1973, Mississippi County's population decreased by 2,867 people, or 4.5 percent, from 63,012 to 60,145.

The county's population approached its historic high in 1975, increasing by 2,358 people from 1973. From 1975 to 1981, the county's population decreased by a net 3,456 people, or 5.5 percent, from 62,503 to 59,047. The rate of population loss decelerated from 1981 to 1991, during which time the county's population declined by a net 1,591 people, or 2.7 percent, to 57,456. In 1992 and 1993, the county's population decreased by 1,963 people and 3,705 people, respectively.

The county's population increased by a net 608 people from 1993 to 1998. Since 1998, the county's population decreased by 2,016 people, or 3.8 percent, from 52,396 in 1998 to 50,380 in 2002. The county was the 15th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Mississippi County is projected to decrease by 3,479 people, or 6.9 percent, to 46,901 by 2010 and by 9,700 people, or 19.3 percent, to 40,680 by 2025 (see Table 47). The county's population is projected to be between 44,659 and 49,257 in 2010 and between 36,192 and 45,725 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Mississippi County will be the 15th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 20th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Monroe County

Monroe County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Monroe County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Brinkley (3,940), Clarendon (1,960), and Holly Grove (722).



Monroe County experienced year-on-year population declines in 31 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure

49). For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 6,152 people, or 38.8 percent (or negative 1.5 percent per annum), from its historical high of 15,841 in 1969 to 9,689 in 2002.

From 1969 to 1974, the county's population declined by 1,618 people, or 10.2 percent, to 14,223. After increasing by 439 people in 1975, the county's population declined for 21 consecutive years. From 1975 to 1982, the county's population decreased by 957 people, or 6.5 percent, to 13,705. From 1982 to 1990, the county's population declined by 2,384 people, or 17.4 percent, to 11,321.

Population losses moderated from 1990 to 1997, during which time the county's population decreased by a net 691 people, or 6.1 percent, to 10,630. From 1997 to 2002, the population of Monroe County decreased by 941 people, or 8.9 percent, to 9,689. The county was the 66th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Monroe County is projected to decrease by 1,269 people, or 13.1 percent, to 8,420 by 2010 and by 3,296 people, or 34.0 percent, to 6,393 by 2025 (see Table 48). The county's population is projected to be between 8,005 and 8,857 in 2010 and between 5,700 and 7,170 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Monroe County will be the 6th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 4th least populous county in the state in 2025.




Figure 49: Monroe County Historical Population and Population Projections

Montgomery County

Montgomery County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Montgomery County, and their 2000 population levels, include the city of Mount Ida (981) and the towns of Norman (423), Oden (220), and Black Springs (114).




Figure 50: Montgomery County Historical Population and Population Projections

The County experienced relatively strong population growth from 1971 to 1980 (see Figure 50). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 2,053 people, or 36.1 percent (or 3.5 percent per annum), from 5,690 to 7,743. From 1980 to 1991, the county's population grew by a net 159 people to 7,902 and ranged from 7,571 in 1982 to 7,921 in 1987.

From 1991 to 2002, the population of Montgomery County increased by a net 1,341 people, or 17.0 percent, from 7,902 to 9,243. The county was the 68th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002. Despite the modest population losses in 2001 and 2002, the longer term trend suggests an increasing population in Montgomery County in the foreseeable future.

Based on the 1991 to 2002 trend, the population of Montgomery County is projected to increase by 1,497 people, or 16.2 percent, to 10,740 by 2010 and by 4,393 people, or 47.5 percent, to 13,636 by 2025 (see Table 49). The county's population is projected to be between 10,381 and 11,112 in 2010 and between 12,872 and 14,446 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Montgomery County will be the 65th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 57th most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Nevada County

Nevada County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Nevada County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Prescott (3,686) and Emmet (480 of the city's 506 residents in 2000 lived in Nevada County), and the towns of Rosston (265), Willisville (188), Bluff City (158), and Bodcaw (154).




Figure 51: Nevada County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1973, the population of Nevada County increased by 597 people, or 5.9 percent, from 10,115 to 10,712. From 1973 to 1976, the county's population declined by a net 83 people to 10,629. From 1977 to 1979, the county's population increased by 660 people, or 6.2 percent, to an historical high of 11,289 in 1979 (see Figure 51).

The county then experienced 13 years of population declines totaling 1,290 people. From 1980 to 1987, the county's population declined by 382 people, or 3.4 percent, from 11,096 to 10,714. From 1987 to 1990, the county's population decreased by 638 people, or 6.0 percent, to 10,076.

The population of Nevada County remained relatively stable from 1990 to 1997. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 15 people to 10,091. Since 1997, the county's population has decreased by a net 349 people, or 3.5 percent, to 9,742. The county was the 11th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Nevada County is projected to decrease by 483 people, or 5.0 percent, to 9,259 by 2010 and by 1,381 people, or 14.2 percent, to 8,361 by 2025 (see Table 50). The county's population is projected to be between 8,895 and 9,639 in 2010 and between 7,633 and 9,156 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Nevada County will be the 9th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 6th least populous county in the state in 2025.

Newton County

Newton County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Newton County, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Jasper (498) and the town of Western Grove (407).




Figure 52: Newton County Historical Population and Population Projections

Newton County experienced relatively strong population



growth from 1971 to 1977 (see Figure 52). For the period, the county's population increased by 1,500 people, or 25.2 percent (or 3.8 percent per annum), from 5,954 to 7,454. From 1977 to 1992, the county's population remained relatively stable. For the period, the population of Newton County increased by a net 257 people, or 3.4 percent, to 7,711 and ranged from 7,454 in 1977 to 7,862 in 1986.

From 1992 to 1995, the county's population increased by 509 people, or 6.6 percent, to 8,220. Since 1995, population growth in Newton County has slowed. The county experienced modest population losses in 1996 and 1998, and after reaching an historical high of 8,639 people in 2000, experienced a loss of 143 people in 2001. For the period, though, the county's population increased by a net 286 people, or 3.5 percent, to 8,506 in 2002. The county was the 5th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Newton County is projected to increase by 535 people, or 6.3 percent, to 9,041 by 2010 and by 1,433 people, or 16.8 percent, to 9,939 by 2025 (see Table 51). The county's population is projected to be between 8,578 and 9,529 in 2010 and between 8,926 and 11,067 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Newton County will be the 7th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 10th least populous county in the state in 2025.

Ouachita County

Ouachita County is located in south-central Arkansas and is a component of the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Ouachita County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Camden (13,154), Stephens (1,152), Bearden (1,125), East Camden (902), Chidester (335), and Louann (195).




Figure 53: Ouachita County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population decreased by 809 people, or 2.6 percent, from 31,029 in 1969 to 30,220 in 1971. From 1971 to 1977, the population of Ouachita County remained relatively stable (see Figure 53), ranging from 30,220 to 30,493. In 1977, the county's population was 30,236, a net increase of 16 people since 1971.

From 1977 to 1982, the county's population increased by 687 people, or 2.3 percent, to 30,923. From 1982 to 1985, population growth accelerated, during which time the county's population increased by 1,061 people to an historical high of 31,984.

The population of Ouachita County has decreased every year since 1985. From 1985 to 1989, the county's population declined by 527 people to 31,419. Population losses in 1990 and 1991 were 999 people and 349 people, respectively.

Population loss decelerated from 1991 to 1998, during which time the county's population decreased by 922 people, or 3.1 percent, from 30,026 to 29,104. From 1998 to 2002, the county's population decreased by 1,236 people, or 4.2 percent, to an historical low of 27,868. The county was the 24th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Ouachita County is projected to decrease by 2,359 people, or 8.5 percent, to 25,509 by 2010 and by 6,338 people, or 22.7 percent, to 21,530 by 2025 (see Table 52). The county's population is projected to be between 24,397 and 26,675 in 2010 and between 19,355 and 23,949 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Ouachita County will be the 26th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 38th most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Perry County

Perry County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Perry County, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Perryville (1,458) and the towns of Bigelow (329), Perry (314), Casa (209), Adona (187), and Houston (159). Effective June 6, 2003, Perry County is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.




Figure 54: Perry County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced year-on-year population increases in 31 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 54). For the period, the county's population grew by a net 4,865 people, or 87.3 percent (or 1.9 percent per annum), from 5,571 to 10,436. The county experienced relatively strong population growth from 1969 to 1979. For the period, the county's population increased by 1,973 people, or 35.4 percent, to 7,544.

After decreasing by 253 people in 1980, the county's population increased by 751 people, or 10.3 percent, from 7,291 in 1980 to 8,042 in 1988. From 1990 to 1998, the population of Perry County increased by 2,049 people, or 25.7 percent, to 10,022. Since 1998, population gains in Perry County have decelerated. For the period, the county's population increased by 414 people, or 4.1 percent, to an historical high of 10,436 in 2002. The county was the 64th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Perry County is projected to increase by 890 people, or 8.5 percent, to 11,326 by 2010 and by 2,776 people, or 26.6 percent, to 13,212 by 2025 (see Table 53). The county's population is projected to be between 11,107 and 11,552 in 2010 and between 12,606 and 13,847 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Perry County will be the 62nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 58th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Phillips County

Phillips County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Phillips County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of West Helena (8,689), Helena (6,323), Marvell (1,395), Elaine (865), Lake View (531), and Lexa (331).




Figure 55: Phillips County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county experienced year-on-year population losses in 31 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 55). For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 15,533 people, or 38.3 percent (or 1.4 percent per annum), from 40,534 to 25,001. From 1969 to 1974, the population of Phillips County declined by 3,261 people, or 8.0 percent, from 40,534 to 37,273.

After increasing by 358 people in 1975, the county's population decreased for 18 consecutive years. From 1975 to 1991, the population of Phillips County decreased by 9,465 people, or 25.2 percent, from 37,631 to 28,166.

Population declines slowed in 1992 and 1993. From 1994 to 1998, the county's population fell by 884 people, or 3.2 percent, from 28,050 to 27,166. Since 1998, the county's population has decreased by 2,165 people, or 8.0 percent, to 25,001. The county was the 28th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Phillips County is projected to decrease by 3,365 people, or 13.5 percent, to 21,636 by 2010 and by 8,729 people, or 34.9 percent, to 16,272 by 2025 (see Table 54). The county's population is projected to be between 20,649 and 22,668 in 2010 and between 14,640 and 18,084 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Phillips County will be the 35th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 48th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Pike County

Pike County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Pike County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Murfreesboro (1,764), Glenwood (1,751), and Delight (311) and the towns of Antoine (156) and Daisy (118).



From 1969 to 1975, the county's population grew by 1,123 people, or 13.0 percent, from 8,648 to 9,771. After decreasing by




Figure 56: Pike County Historical Population and Population Projections

181 people in 1976, the county's population experienced relatively strong growth through 1979 (see Figure 56), increasing by 775 people, or 8.1 percent, from 9,590 to 10,365. From 1979 to 1982, the county's population decreased by 250 people to 10,115. The county's population remained relatively stable from 1982 to 1991, ranging from 9,994 to 10,187.

From 1991 to 1998, the county's population increased by 1,142 people, or 11.4 percent, to 11,176. From 1998 to 2002, the county's population decreased by a net 39 people to 11,137. The county was the 62nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Because the population trend is not clearly identifiable after 1998, the projections, based on the data from 1998 through 2002, are for population growth in Pike County to remain close to zero. The population of Pike County is projected to increase by 44 people, or 0.4 percent, to 11,181 by 2010 and by 14 people, or 0.1 percent, to 11,151 by 2025 (see Table 55). The county's population is projected to be between 10,299 and 12,139 in 2010 and between 9,165 and 13,566 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Pike County will be the 64th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 63rd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Poinsett County

Poinsett County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Poinsett County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Trumann (6,889), Marked Tree (2,800), Harrisburg (2,192), and Lepanto (2,133). Effective June 6, 2003, the county is a component of the Jonesboro MSA.




Figure 57: Poinsett County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1970 to 1977, the county's population increased by a net 1,094 people, or 4.1 percent, from 26,911 to an historic high of 28,005. The population of Poinsett County then decreased for the next 14 years (see Figure 57). From 1977 to 1984, the county's population declined by 2,262 people, or 8.1 percent, to 25,743. From 1984 to 1991, the county's population decreased by 1,342 people, or 5.2 percent.

After increasing by a net 1,089 people from 1991 to 1998, the county's population decreased by a net 89 people to 25,401 in 2002. The county was the 26th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Because the population trend is not clearly identifiable after 1998, the projections, based on the data from 1998 through 2002, are for population growth in Poinsett County to be near zero during the forecast period. The county's population is projected to decrease by 4 people to 25,397 by 2010 and by 191 people, or 0.8 percent, to 25,210 by 2025 (see Table 56). The county's population is projected to be between 24,382 and 26,458 in 2010 and between 22,870 and 27,789 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Poinsett County will be the 27th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 28th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Polk County

Polk County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Polk County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Mena (5,637), Wickes (675), Grannis (575), Hatfield (402), Cove (383), and Vandervoort (120).

From 1969 to 1977, the county's population grew by 4,132 people, or 31.3 percent (or 3.5 percent per annum), from 13,188 to




Figure 58: Polk County Historical Population and Population Projections

17,320. From 1977 to 1990, the county's population remained relatively stable (see Figure 58), ranging from 17,023 to 17,373. For the period, the county's population grew by a net 41 people to 17,361 in 1990.

The county experienced relatively strong population growth from 1990 to 1997. For the period, the county's population increased by 2,542 people, or 14.6 percent, to 19,903. Population growth decelerated from 1997 to 2002. For the period, the population of Polk County increased by a net 297 people, or 1.5 percent. The county was the 38th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 20,200.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Polk County is projected to increase by 486 people, or 2.4 percent, to 20,686 by 2010 and by 1,326 people, or 6.6 percent, to 21,526 by 2025 (see Table 57). The county's population is projected to be between 19,998 and 21,397 in 2010 and between 19,940 and 23,237 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Polk County will be the 37th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 39th most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Pope County

Pope County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Pope County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Russellville (23,682), Atkins (2,878), Dover (1,329), Pottsville (1,271), London (925), and Hector (506).




Figure 59: Pope County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Pope County increased every year from 1969 to 2002 (see Figure 59). Year-on-year population gains exceeded 1,000 people 9 times during the period. The county's population grew by 27,310 people, or 97.8 percent (or 2.1 percent per annum), from 27,913 in 1969 to 55,223 in 2002.

From 1969 to 1973, the county's population increased by 5,445 people, or 4.6 percent per annum on average, to 33,358. From 1973 to 1989, the population of Pope County increased by 11,590 people to 44,948 in 1989. From 1989 to 1995, the county's population increased by 6,528 people, or 2.3 percent per annum on average, to 51,476.

Since 1995, population growth has slowed. From 1995 to 2002, the county's population increased by 3,747 people, or 1.0 percent per annum on average, to 55,223. The county was the 12th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Pope County is projected to increase by 5,338 people, or 9.7 percent, to 60,561 by 2010 and by 15,995 people, or 29.0 percent, to 71,218 by 2025 (see Table 58). The county's population is projected to be between 58,912 and 62,262 in 2010 and between 67,306 and 75,358 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Pope County will be the 13th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Prairie County

Prairie County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Prairie County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Des Arc (1,933), Hazen (1,637), De Valls Bluff (783), Fredonia (Biscoe) (476), and Ulm (205).




Figure 60: Prairie County Historical Population and Population Projections

After increasing by 320 people to 10,626 in 1971, the population of Prairie County decreased by a net 130 people from 1971 to 1974. In 1975, the county's population increased by 312 people to an historical high of 10,808 (see Figure 60). From 1975 to 1979, the county's population declined by 773 people, or 7.2 percent, to 10,035.

From 1979 to 1983, the population of Prairie County increased by a net 10 people to 10,045. The county's population then experienced declines for 9 consecutive years. From 1983 to 1992, the county's population fell by 718 people, or 7.1 percent, to 9,327.

From 1992 to 1998, the county's population increased by a net 332 people, or 3.5 percent, to 9,649. Since 1998, the county's population has decreased by a net 209 people to 9,440 in 2002. The county was the 9th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Prairie County is projected to decrease by 348 people, or 3.7 percent, to 9,092 by 2010 and by 988 people, or 10.5 percent, to 8,452 by 2025 (see Table 59). The county's population is projected to be between 8,750 and 9,447 in 2010 and between 7,713 and 9,261 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Prairie County will be the 8th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 7th least populous county in the state in 2025.

Pulaski County

Pulaski County, the most populous county in Arkansas in 2002, is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Pulaski County, and their 2000 population levels, include the state's capital city, Little Rock (183,133), and the cities of North Little Rock (60,433), Jacksonville (29,916), Sherwood (21,511), and Maumelle (10,557). The county is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.




Figure 61: Pulaski County Historical Population and Population Projections

Pulaski County experienced population growth in 28 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002 (see Figure 61). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 81,066 people, or 28.6 percent (or 0.8 percent per annum), from 283,315 to 364,381.

From 1969 to 1974, the county's population increased by 35,346 people, or 12.5 percent, to 318,661. From 1974 to 1987, population growth decelerated. During this period, the county's population increased by 34,326 people, or 10.8 percent, to 352,897.

From 1987 to 1990, the county's population decreased by a net 2,837 people, or 0.8 percent, to 350,060. From 1990 to 1993, the population of Pulaski County increased by 8,052 people, or 2.3 percent, to 358,112. From 1993 to 1997, the county experienced a net population loss of 66 people. Since 1997, the county's population has increased by 6,335 people, or 1.8 percent. The population of Pulaski County stood at 364,381 in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Pulaski County is projected to increase by 10,326 people, or 2.8 percent, to 374,707 by 2010 and by 30,800, or 8.5 percent, to 395,181 by 2025 (see Table 60). The county's population is projected to be between 373,286 and 376,171 in 2010 and between 391,758 and 398,634 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Pulaski County will be supplanted by Benton County as the most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Randolph County

Randolph County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Randolph County, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Pocahontas (6,518) and the towns of Reyno (484), Maynard (381), Biggers (355), O'Kean (201), and Ravenden Springs (137).




Figure 62: Randolph County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1975, the population of Randolph County increased by 3,236 people, or 25.6 percent, from 12,629 to 15,865. Population growth decelerated from 1975 to 1980 (see Figure 62), during which time the county's population increased by 922 people, or 5.8 percent, to 16,787. The county's population declined by 433 people, or 2.6 percent, from 1980 to 1988.

From 1988 to 1996, the county's population grew by 1,437 people, or 8.8 percent, to 17,791. The county's population reached an historic high in 2001 at 18,239, 2.5 percent greater than its level in 1996. In 2002, the county's population decreased by 137 people to 18,102. The county was the 41st most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Randolph County is projected to increase by 651 people, or 3.6 percent, to 18,753 by 2010 and by 1,642 people, or 9.1 percent, to 19,744 by 2025 (see Table 61). The county's population is projected to be between 18,162 and 19,365 in 2010 and between 18,428 and 21,152 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Randolph County will be the 43rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 41st most populous county in the state in 2025.

St. Francis County

St. Francis County is located in the Southeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in St. Francis County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Forrest City (14,774), Hughes (1,867), Madison (987), Palestine (741), and the town of Caldwell (465).




Figure 63: St. Francis County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1971 to 1978, the population of St. Francis County increased by a net 1,424 people, or 4.7 percent, to an historical high of 31,516 (see Figure 63). The county's population then decreased in 15 years of the subsequent 24 years.

From 1978 to 1986, the county's population decreased by 1,107 people, or 3.5 percent, to 30,409. Population losses accelerated from 1986 to 1990, during which time the county's population decreased by 1,928 people, or 6.3 percent, to 28,481. The county experienced mild population growth from 1990 to 1993. From 1993 to 1997, the county's population increased by 1,101 people, or 3.9 percent, to 29,648.

Population losses resumed in 1997. From 1997 to 2002, the county's population decreased by 875 people, or 2.4 percent, to 28,773. The county was the 23rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of St. Francis County is projected to decrease by 1,343 people, or 4.7 percent, to 27,430 by 2010 and by 3,744 people, or 13.0 percent, to 25,029 by 2025 (see Table 62). The county's population is projected to be between 26,860 and 28,015 in 2010 and between 23,863 and 26,255 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, St. Francis County will be the 25th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 30th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Saline County

Saline County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Saline County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Benton (21,906), Bryant (9,764), Haskell (2,645), and Shannon Hills (2,005), the East End CDP (5,623), and the Salem CDP (2,789). The county is a component of the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA.



Saline County experienced year-on-year population gains each year from 1969 to 2002. Year-on-year gains exceeded 1,000 people 27 times, 2,000 people 7 times, and 2,500 people 3 times during the period. From 1969 to 2002, the county's population grew by 50,806 people, or 143.2 percent (2.7 percent per annum), from 35,484 to 86,290.




Figure 64: Saline County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1980, the county's population increased by 17,871 people, or 50.4 percent, to 53,355. Population growth decelerated from 1980 to 1984 (see Figure 64), during which time the county's population increased by 2,982 people, or 5.6 percent, to 56,337. From 1984 to 1992, the county's population increased by 11,412 people, or 20.3 percent, to 67,749.

Population growth accelerated from 1992 to 1997, during which time the county's population increased by 11,015 people, or 16.3 percent. From 1997 to 2002, the county's population increased by 7,526 people, or 9.6 percent, to 86,290. The county was the 7th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Saline County is projected to increase by 14,098 people, or 16.3 percent, to 100,388 by 2010 and by 46,073 people, or 53.4 percent, to 132,363 by 2025 (see Table 63). The county's population is projected to be between 97,587 and 103,280 in 2010 and between 124,119 and 141,153 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Saline County will be the 7th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 6th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Scott County

Scott County is located in western Arkansas along the border with Oklahoma and is a component of the Northwest Arkansas planning area. The county's population centers, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Waldron (3,508) and Mansfield (391 of the city's 1,097 residents in 2000 lived in Scott County).




Figure 65: Scott County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1975, the county's population increased by 1,433 people, or 17.6 percent, to 9,568. From 1975 to 1982, the county's population was relatively stable, ranging from 9,346 to 9,679 (see Figure 65). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 26 people. From 1982 to 1987, the population of Scott County grew by 765 people, or 8.0 percent, from 9,594 to 10,359.

After decreasing by 159 people from 1987 to 1990, the county's population increased by 929 people, or 9.1 percent, from 10,200 in 1990 to an historic high of 11,129 in 1997. The county's population decreased by 246 people from 1997 to 1998 and then increased by a net 121 people from 10,977 in 1998 to 11,004 in 2002. The county was the 63rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Scott County is projected to increase by 227 people, or 2.1 percent, to 11,231 by 2010 and by 624 people, or 5.7 percent, to 11,628 by 2025 (see Table 64). The county's population is projected to be between 10,826 and 11,649 in 2010 and between 10,655 and 12,690 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Scott County will be the 63rd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 62nd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Searcy County

Searcy County is located in north-central Arkansas and is a component of the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Searcy County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Marshall (1,313) and Leslie (482).



The population of Searcy County increased by a net 1,291 people, or 16.6 percent, from 7,785 in 1969 to an historical high of




Figure 66: Searcy County Historical Population and Population Projections

9,076 in 1977. From 1977 to 1986, the county's population declined by 549 people, or 6.0 percent, to 8,527. Population loss accelerated from 1986 to 1992 (see Figure 66), during which time the population of Searcy County decreased by 860 people, or 10.1 percent, to 7,667.

From 1992 to 1997, the county's population increased by 381 people, or 5.0 percent, to 8,048. Population growth was relatively flat from 1997 to 2002. The county was the 2nd least populous county in Arkansas in 2002 with a population of 8,039.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Searcy County is projected to increase by 223 people, or 2.8 percent, to 8,262 by 2010 and by 423 people, or 5.3 percent, to 8,462 by 2025 (see Table 65). The county's population is projected to be between 7,488 and 9,115 in 2010 and between 6,772 and 10,572 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Searcy County will be the 5th least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 8th least populous county in the state in 2025.

Sebastian County

Sebastian County is located along the western border of Arkansas with Oklahoma and is a component of the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Sebastian County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Fort Smith (80,268), Greenwood (7,112), Barling (4,176), and Lavaca (1,825). The county is a component of the Fort Smith MSA.



Sebastian County experienced year-on-year population gains in 30 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 39,046 people, or 49.9 percent (1.4 percent per annum), from 78,174 to 117,220. From 1969 to 1978, the county's population grew by 16,080 people, or 20.6 percent, to 94,254.




Figure 67: Sebastian County Historical Population and Population Projections

Population growth slowed from 1978 to 1990 (see Figure 67), during which time the county's population increased by a net 5,489 people, or 5.8 percent, to 99,743. From 1990 to 1997, the county's population grew by 11,698 people, or 11.7 percent, to 111,441. Since 1997, the county's population has increased by 5,779 people, or 5.2 percent, to 117,220. The county was the 4th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Sebastian County is projected to increase by 11,077 people, or 9.4 percent, to 128,297 by 2010 and by 34,032 people, or 29.0 percent, to 151,252 by 2025 (see Table 66). The county's population is projected to be between 124,617 and 132,072 in 2010 and between 141,620 and 161,539 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Sebastian County will be the 4th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 5th most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Sevier County

Sevier County is located in the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Sevier County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of De Queen (5,765) and Horatio (997) and the towns of Lockesburg (711), Gillham (188), and Ben Lomond (126).



From 1969 to 1980, the population of Sevier County increased by 2,886 people, or 25.8 percent, from 11,177 to 14,063. From 1980 to 1989, the county's population decreased by a net 646 people, or 4.6 percent, to 13,417.




Figure 68: Sevier County Historical Population and Population Projections

After increasing by 1,148 people from 1989 to 1992, population growth in Sevier County decelerated (see Figure 68). From 1992 to 2002, the county's population increased by a net 1,246 people, or 8.6 percent, from 14,565 to 15,811. The county was the 50th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1992 to 2002 trend, the population of Sevier County is projected to increase by 1,309 people, or 8.3 percent, to 17,120 by 2010 and by 3,688 people, or 23.3 percent, to 19,499 by 2025 (see Table 67). The county's population is projected to be between 16,714 and 17,536 in 2010 and between 18,689 and 20,343 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Sevier County will be the 47th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 43rd most populous county in the state in 2025.

Sharp County

Sharp County is located in the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Sharp County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Cherokee Village (3,839 of the city's 4,648 residents lived in Sharp County in 2000), Cave City (1,884 of the city's 1,946 residents lived in Sharp County in 2000), Highland (986), Ash Flat (975 of the city's 977 residents in 2000 lived in Sharp County), and Hardy (578).



From 1969 to 1981, the population of Sharp County increased by 6,637 people, or 82.3 percent, from 8,064 to 14,701. The county's population then decreased by a net 606 people, or 4.1 percent, to 14,095 in 1989.




Figure 69: Sharp County Historical Population and Population Projections

After a modest increase from 1989 to 1990, population growth in Sharp County accelerated from 1990 to 1996 (see Figure 69). For the period, the county's population increased by 2,230 people, or 15.8 percent, to 16,358. From 1996 to 2002, the county's population grew by a net 912 people, or 5.6 percent, to 17,270. The county was the 45th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Sharp County is projected to increase by 1,571 people, or 9.1 percent, to 18,841 by 2010 and by 4,601 people, or 26.6 percent, to 21,871 by 2025 (see Table 68). The county's population is projected to be between 18,272 and 19,427 in 2010 and between 20,476 and 23,360 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Sharp County will be the 42nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 36th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Stone County

Stone County is located in north-central Arkansas and is a component of the Northeast Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Stone County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Mountain View (2,876) and Fifty-Six (163).



Stone County experienced year-on-year population gains in 30 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 4,722 people, or 69.5 percent (1.6 percent per annum), from 6,796 to 11,518. From 1969 to 1980, the county's population increased by 2,251 people, or 33.1 percent, to 9,047.




Figure 70: Stone County Historical Population and Population Projections

Population growth slowed from 1980 to 1989 (see Figure 70). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 572 people, or 6.3 percent, to 9,619. From 1989 to 1996, the population of Stone County grew by 1,345 people, or 14.0 percent, to 10,964. Since 1996, population growth in Stone County has slowed. During this period, the county's population increased by a net 554 people, or 5.1 percent, to 11,518. Stone County was the 61st most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Stone County is projected to increase by 863 people, or 7.5 percent, to 12,381 by 2010 and by 2,485 people, or 21.6 percent, to 14,003 by 2025 (see Table 69). The county's population is projected to be between 11,817 and 12,973 in 2010 and between 12,665 and 15,481 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Stone County will be the 59th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 54th most populous county in Arkansas in 2025.

Union County

Union County is located in south-central Arkansas along the border with Louisiana and is a component of the Southwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Union County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of El Dorado (21,530), Smackover (2,005), Norphlet (822), Huttig (731), and Junction City (721).




Figure 71: Union County Historical Population and Population Projections

After decreasing by 1,061 people from 1969 to 1971, the population of Union County increased by 5,186 people, or 11.6 percent, from 44,876 in 1971 to an historic high of 50,062 in 1979 (see Figure 71). From 1979 to 1981, the county's population decreased by 1,581 people and remained relatively stable from 1981 to 1985.

From 1985 to 1989, the county's population decreased by 1,774 people, or 3.7 percent, from 48,499 to 46,725. The rate of population loss decelerated from 1989 to 1995, during which time the county's population decreased by a net 193 people to 46,532. From 1995 to 2002, the population of Union County decreased by 1,253 people, or 2.7 percent, to 45,279. The county was the 16th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Union County is projected to decrease by 1,544 people, or 3.4 percent, to 43,735 by 2010 and by 4,083 people, or 9.0 percent, to 41,196 by 2025 (see Table 70). The county's population is projected to be between 43,153 and 44,325 in 2010 and between 40,083 and 42,341 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Union County will be the 16th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 19th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Van Buren County

Van Buren County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Van Buren County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Fairfield Bay (2,314 of the city's 2,460 residents in 2000 lived in Van Buren County) and Clinton (2,283) and the town of Shirley (337).




Figure 72: Van Buren County Historical Population and Population Projections

From 1969 to 1979, the population of Van Buren County increased by 5,008 people, or 61.2 percent, from 8,177 to 13,185. Population growth slowed from 1979 to 1990 (see Figure 72). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 872 people, or 6.6 percent, to 14,057.

From 1990 to 1997, the population of Van Buren County increased by a net 1,846 people, or 13.1 percent, to 15,903. Population growth slowed from 1997 to 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 411 people, or 2.6 percent, to 16,314. Van Buren County was the 48th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Van Buren County is projected to increase by 909 people, or 5.6 percent, to 17,223 by 2010 and by 2,588 people, or 15.9 percent, to 18,902 by 2025 (see Table 71). The county's population is projected to be between 16,699 and 17,765 in 2010 and between 17,622 and 20,274 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Van Buren County will be the 46th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 45th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Washington County

Washington County is located in the Northwest Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Washington County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Fayetteville (58,047), Springdale (43,787 of the city's 45,798 residents in 2000 lived in Washington County), Farmington (3,605), Prairie Grove (2,540), Johnson (2,319), and West Fork (2,042). The county is a component of the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA.



Like Benton County, the growth of Washington County's population and the economic activity taking place within the county during the last three decades is nothing short of remarkable. The county's population in 2002 (166,511) is roughly 2.2 times greater than in 1969 (75,186). This translates to an annual growth rate of 2.4 percent. For the period, year-on-year population gains exceeded 2,000 people 20 times, 3,000 people 12 times, 4,000 people 8 times, 5,000 people 4 times, and exceeded 6,000 people in 1995.




Figure 73: Washington County Historical Population and Population Projections

Much of the growth in Washington County can be attributed, either directly or indirectly, to the emergence of Wal-Mart, whose corporate headquarters are located in Bentonville in Benton County, as the world's largest retailer and the world's largest private employer. Particularly impressive have been the population gains from 1989 to 2002 (see Figure 73). For the period, the county's population grew by 55,384 people, or 49.8 percent (3.2 percent per annum), from 111,127 to 166,511.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Washington County is projected to increase by 32,020 people, or 19.2 percent, to 198,531 by 2010 and by 110,330 people, or 66.3 percent, to 276,841 by 2025 (see Table 72). The county's population is projected to be between 191,703 and 205,603 in 2010 and between 255,736 and 299,689 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Washington County will likely be supplanted by Benton County as the 2nd most populous county in Arkansas in 2003 and is projected to remain as the 3rd most populous county in the state through 2025.

White County

White County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in White County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Searcy (18,928), Beebe (4,930), Bald Knob (3,210), Judsonia (1,982), and Kensett (1,791).



White County experienced year-on-year population gains in 31 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 30,665, or 79.3 percent (1.8 percent per annum), from 38,689 to 69,354. From 1969 to 1980, the county's population increased by 12,274 people, or 31.7 percent, to 50,963.




Figure 74: White County Historical Population and Population Projections

Population growth slowed from 1980 to 1988 (see Figure 74). For the period, the county's population increased by a net 2,358 people, or 4.6 percent, to 53,321. Population growth accelerated from 1988 to 1998, during which time the county's population increased by 12,464 people, or 23.4 percent, to 65,785.

Since 1998, population growth has slowed. From 1998 to 2002, the county's population increased by 3,569 people, or 5.4 percent, to 69,354. White County was the 10th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of White County is projected to increase by 8,205 people, or 11.8 percent, to 77,559 by 2010 and by 26,196 people, or 37.8 percent, to 95,550 by 2025 (see Table 73). The county's population is projected to be between 75,350 and 79,834 in 2010 and between 89,188 and 102,365 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, White County will be the 10th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 9th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Woodruff County

Woodruff County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Woodruff County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Augusta (2,665), McCrory (1,850), and Cotton Plant (960) and the towns of Patterson (467) and Hunter (152).



The population of Woodruff County declined in all but 6 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. For the period, the county's population decreased by a net 3,365 people, or 28.4 percent (1.0 percent per annum), from 11,831 to 8,466. From 1969 to 1972, the county's population declined by 1,416 people, or 12.0 percent, to 10,415.




Figure 75: Woodruff County Historical Population and Population Projections

The population of Woodruff County increased by a net 812 people, or 7.8 percent, from 1972 to 11,227 in 1979. The county's population decreased every year from 1979 to 1993 (see Figure 75). Population losses totaled 2,032 people, or 18.1 percent, for the period.

After a net gain of 41 people from 1993 to 1996, the county's population decreased by a net 770 people, or 8.3 percent, from 9,236 in 1996 to 8,466 in 2002. The county was the 4th least populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1996 to 2002 trend, the population of Woodruff County is projected to decrease by 842 people, or 9.9 percent, to 7,624 by 2010 and by 2,252 people, or 26.6 percent, to 6,214 by 2025 (see Table 74). The county's population is projected to be between 7,390 and 7,865 in 2010 and between 5,811 and 6,644 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Woodruff County will be the 3rd least populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and 2025.

Yell County

Yell County is located in the Central Arkansas planning area. Population centers in Yell County, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities of Dardanelle (4,228), Danville (2,392), Ola (1,204), Plainview (755), Havana (392), and Belleville (371).



Yell County experienced year-on-year population gains in 27 of the 33 years between 1969 and 2002. For the period, the county's population increased by a net 7,387 people, or 52.7 percent (1.3 percent per annum), from 14,023 to 21,410. From 1969 to 1977, the county's population increased by 3,855 people, or 27.5 percent, to 17,878.




Figure 76: Yell County Historical Population and Population Projections

The county's population then declined from 1977 to 1980 (see Figure 76). For the period, the county's population decreased by 836 people, or 4.7 percent, to 17,042. From 1980 to 1990, the county's population increased by a net 780 people to 17,822.

The population of Yell County has increased every year since 1990. From 1990 to 1997, the county's population grew by 2,819 people, or 15.8 percent, to 20,641. Population growth slowed from 1997 to 2002, during which time the county's population increased by 769 people, or 3.7 percent, to 21,410. The county was the 35th most populous county in Arkansas in 2002.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Yell County is projected to increase by 1,383 people, or 6.5 percent, to 22,793 by 2010 and by 4,130 people, or 19.3 percent, to 25,540 by 2025 (see Table 75). The county's population is projected to be between 22,420 and 23,170 in 2010 and between 24,602 and 26,513 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Yell County will be the 34th most populous county in Arkansas in 2010 and the 27th most populous county in the state in 2025.

Population Projections, Counties and Parishes Bordering Arkansas

Economic activity within a county or state is clearly not generated solely by those people who are residents of that county or state. Governments and businesses should be mindful of nearby populations because these people are current or potential customers and users of infrastructure. As such, this section provides population projections for the counties and parishes in Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas that border counties in Arkansas.

Louisiana

The following parishes in Louisiana border counties in Arkansas: Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, East Carroll, Morehouse, Union, and Webster. The combined population of these parishes was 484,260 in 2002. A brief discussion of historical population trends and the population projections for each of these parishes is presented below.

Bossier Parish

Bossier Parish borders the following Arkansas counties: Lafayette (page 79) and Miller (page 97). Population centers in Bossier Parish, and their 2000 population levels, include the cities and towns of Bossier City (56,461), Red Chute CDP (5,984), Eastwood CDP (3,374), Haughton (2,792), Benton (2,035), and Plain Dealing (1,071). The parish is a component of the Shreveport-Bossier City MSA.

Bossier Parish experienced relatively strong population growth from 1992 to 1997. For the period, the parish's population increased by 9,573 people, or 11.0 percent, from 87,086 to 96,659. Population growth slowed from 1998 to 2002, during which time the parish's population increased by 4,858 people, or 5.1 percent, from 95,878 to 100,736.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Bossier Parish is projected to increase by 10,599 people, or 10.5 percent, to 111,335 by 2010 and by 33,211 people, or 33.0 percent, to 133,947 by 2025. The parish's population is projected to be between 109,272 and 113,437 in 2010 and between 128,104 and 140,042 in 2025.




Figure 77: Bossier Parish Historical Population and Population Projections

Caddo Parish

Caddo Parish borders the following Arkansas counties: Lafayette (page 79) and Miller (page 97). Population centers in Caddo Parish, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Shreveport (199,411 of the city's 200,145 residents in 2000 lived in Caddo Parish) and the towns of Vivian (4,031), Greenwood (2,458), Blanchard (2,050), and Oil City (1,219). The parish is a component of the Shreveport-Bossier City MSA.

Caddo Parish experienced relatively strong population growth from 1970 to 1986. For the period, the parish's population increased by 34,171 people, or 14.8 percent, from 230,482 to 264,653. Roughly half of these population gains were lost from 1986 to 1991. Population growth resumed from 1991 to 1995. Since 1995, the parish's population has decreased by a net 814 people, or 0.3 percent, from 251,959 to 251,145.

Based on the 1995 to 2002 trend, the population of Caddo Parish is projected to decrease by 197 people, or 0.1 percent, to 250,948 by 2010 and by 1,249 people, or 0.5 percent, to 249,896 by 2025. The parish's population is projected to be between 249,746 and 252,155 in 2010 and between 247,434 and 252,357 in 2025.



Claiborne Parish

Claiborne Parish borders the following Arkansas counties: Columbia (page 33) and Union (page 145). Population centers in Claiborne Parish, and their 2000 population centers, include the towns and villages of Homer (3,788), Haynesville (2,679), Athens (262), and Lisbon (162).

Since 1984, the population of Claiborne Parish has decreased by 1,812 people, or 9.9 percent. The parish experienced relatively small population losses from 1990 to 1998. Since 1998, the parish's population has decreased by 560 people, or 3.3 percent, from 17,012 to 16,452.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of Claiborne Parish is projected to decrease by 1,075 people, or 6.5 percent, to 15,377 by 2010 and by 2,951 people, or 17.9 percent, to 13,501 by 2025. The parish's population is projected to be between 14,906 and 15,862 in 2010 and between 12,534 and 14,541 in 2025.



East Carroll Parish

East Carroll Parish borders Chicot County, Arkansas (page 23). The population center in East Carroll Parish is the town of Lake Providence. Its population in 2000 was 5,104.

Population losses in East Carroll Parish were relatively mild from 1991 to 1998. During the period, the parish's population decreased by a net 107 people, or 1.1 percent, from 9,557 to 9,450. From 1998 to 2002, the parish's population fell by 349 people, or, 3.7 percent, to 9,101.

Based on the 1998 to 2002 trend, the population of East Carroll Parish is projected to decrease by 630 people, or 6.9 percent, to 8,471 by 2010 and by 1,762 people, or 19.4 percent, to 7,339 by 2025. The parish's population is projected to be between 7,911 and 9,072 in 2010 and between 6,234 and 8,640 in 2025.



Morehouse Parish

Morehouse Parish borders the following counties in Arkansas: Ashley (page 9), Chicot (page 23), and Union (page 145). Population centers in Morehouse Parish, and their 2000 population levels, include the City of Bastrop (12,988) and the villages of Mer Rouge (721), Bonita (335), Collinston (327), and Oak Ridge (142).

The population of Morehouse Parish decreased by a net 79 people from 1991 to 1997. Population losses accelerated from 1997 to 2002. For the period, the parish's population decreased by 1,155 people, or 3.7 percent, from 31,598 to 30,443.

Based on the 1997 to 2002 trend, the population of Morehouse Parish is projected to decrease by 1,719 people, or 5.6 percent, to 28,724 by 2010 and by 4,711 people, or 15.5 percent, to 25,732 by 2025. The parish's population is projected to be between 28,404 and 29,045 in 2010 and between 25,089 and 26,389 in 2025.




Figure 81: Morehouse Parish Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 82: Union Parish Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 83: Webster Parish Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 84: West Carroll Parish Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 85: Bolivar County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 87: De Soto County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 89: Marshall County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 91: Tunica County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 92: Washington County, Mississippi Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 93: Barry County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 95: Dunklin County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 96: Howell County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 97: McDonald County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 99: Ozark County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 100: Pemiscot County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 101: Ripley County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 102: Stone County, Missouri Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 103: Taney County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 104: Adair County Historical Population and Population Projections




Figure 105: Delaware County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 107: McCurtain County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 109: Dyer County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 111: Lauderdale County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 113: Tipton County Historical Population and Population Projections






Figure 115: Cass County Historical Population and Population Projections

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Population Projections, Metropolitan Statistical Areas

This section of the report uses the county-level projections discussed above to construct population projections for the state's seven Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs). For readers not familiar with the term, the following comes from the U.S. Census Bureau.

The general concept of a metropolitan or micropolitan statistical area is that of a core area containing a substantial population nucleus, together with adjacent communities having a high degree of social and economic integration with that core. Metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas comprise one or more entire counties...The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) defines metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas for purposes of collecting, tabulating, and publishing Federal data. Metropolitan and micropolitan statistical area definitions result from applying published standards to Census Bureau data.³

The OMB has constructed the following MSAs that incorporate a county or counties in Arkansas: the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA, the Fort Smith MSA, the Jonesboro MSA, the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA, the Memphis MSA, the Pine Bluff MSA, and the Texarkana MSA. The reader may not be aware that the OMB revised the definitions of each of Arkansas' seven MSAs, save the Texarkana MSA, effective June 6, 2003. The discussion that follows provides two sets of population projections for each of the MSAs, one based on the old definition of the MSA and one based on the new definition.

Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA




Figure 116: Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA Historical Population and Projections

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA was defined to be Benton County, Arkansas (page 13) and Washington County, Arkansas (page 149). The phenomenal growth the MSA has experienced during the last three decades, especially during the 1990s and the 2000s (see Figure 116), can be attributed largely to the emergence of Wal-Mart as the world's largest retailer and world's largest private employer. In 1969, the two counties had a total population of 124,357, or 6.5 percent of the state's population. In 2002, Benton County and Washington County, with a total population of 332,011, accounted for 12.3 percent of the state's population.

The population of the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA, defined as Benton and Washington County, is projected to increase by 92,477 people, or 27.9 percent, to 424,488 by 2010 and by 346,465 people, or 104.4 percent, to 678,476 by 2025 (see Table 115). The population of the MSA is projected to be between 412,191 and 437,164 in 2010 and between 637,745 and 721,959 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the MSA will account for 14.5 percent of the state's population in 2010 and 19.5 percent of the state's population in 2025. Such large anticipated growth in the MSA highlights the need for public and private planners and decision-makers, including local, state, and national officials, to make infrastructure investments sufficient to support and accommodate growth of this magnitude in the MSA.

Effective June 6, 2003, the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA is defined to be the above-listed counties plus Madison County, Arkansas (page 93) and McDonald County, Missouri (page 187). Compared to Benton and Washington County, the populations of Madison and McDonald County are relatively small. Given the county-level projections in the previous

section of the report, Benton County and Washington County will likely be driving most of the population growth in the MSA in the projection period.

Based on the new definition for the MSA, the population of the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA is projected to increase by 95,177 people, or 25.9 percent, from 368,043 in 2002 to 463,220 by 2010 and by 354,284 people, or 96.3 percent, to 722,327 by 2025 (see Table 116). The MSA's population is projected to be between 448,900 and 478,040 in 2010 and between 676,460 and 771,501 in 2025. In 2002, the Arkansas counties in the MSA constituted 12.8 percent of the state's population. If the baseline projections are realized, the Arkansas counties in the MSA will account for 15.0 percent of the state's population in 2010 and 20.0 percent of the state's population in 2025.





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Fort Smith MSA

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Fort Smith MSA was defined to be Crawford County, Arkansas (page 39); Sebastian County, Arkansas (page 137); and Sequoyah County, Oklahoma (page 203). Crawford County and Sebastian County had a combined population of 103,491 and accounted for 5.4 percent of the state's population in 1969. In 2002, the two Arkansas counties had a combined population of 172,193 and accounted for 6.4 percent of the state's population.

The population of the Fort Smith MSA is projected to increase by 22,762 people, or 10.7 percent, to 234,807 by 2010 and by 71,556 people, or 33.7 percent, to 283,601 by 2025 (see Table 117). A majority of the projected population growth in the MSA from 2003 to 2025 is projected to occur in Sebastian County and Crawford County. The population of the MSA is projected to be between 229,308 and 240,449 in 2010 and between 268,945 and 299,150 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, Crawford and Sebastian County will have a combined population of 191,715 in 2010 and 233,640 in 2025 and will account for 6.5 percent and 6.7 percent of the state's population in those years, respectively.




Figure 118: Fort Smith MSA Historical Population and Projections

Effective June 6, 2003, the MSA is defined to be the above-listed counties plus Franklin County, Arkansas (page 53) and Le Flore County, Oklahoma (page 200). Based on the new definition for the MSA, the population of the Fort Smith MSA is projected to increase by 25,663 people, or 9.2 percent, from 278,345 in 2002 to 304,008 by 2010 and by 79,942 people, or 28.7 percent, to 358,287 by 2025 (see Table 79). Again, a majority of the projected population

growth in the MSA from 2003 to 2025 is projected to occur in Sebastian County and Crawford County. The MSA's population is projected to be between 296,791 and 311,429 in 2010 and between 339,595 and 378,209 in 2025. In 2002, the Arkansas counties in the MSA constituted 7.0 percent of the state's population. If the baseline projections are realized, the Arkansas counties in the MSA will account for 7.2 percent and 7.3 percent of the state's population in 2010 and 2025, respectively.




Figure 119: Fort Smith MSA, New Definition, Historical Population and Projections

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Jonesboro MSA

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Jonesboro MSA was defined to be Craighead County, Arkansas. Based on this definition, from 1969 to 2002, the proportion of the state's population living in the Jonesboro MSA increased from 2.7 percent to 3.1 percent. The MSA's population is anticipated to grow relatively more quickly than for the state during the projection period. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the MSA will be 3.2 percent in 2010 and 2025. For a more in-depth discussion of population trends and projections for Craighead County, the reader is referred to page 37.




Figure 120: Jonesboro MSA Historical Population and Projections




Figure 121: Jonesboro MSA, New Definition, Historical Population and Projections

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Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA was defined to be Faulkner County, Arkansas (page 51); Lonoke County, Arkansas (page 91); Pulaski County, Arkansas (page 125); and Saline County, Arkansas (page 131). The counties had a combined population of 375,628 in 1969 and accounted for 19.6 percent of the state's population. In 2002, the counties in the MSA had a combined population of 595,563 and constituted 22.0 percent of the state's population.

The MSA's population is projected to increase by 55,063 people, or 9.2 percent, to 650,626 by 2010 and by 181,110 people, or 30.4 percent, to 776,673 by 2025 (see Table 121). A majority of these anticipated gains are projected to occur in Faulkner County and Saline County. The population of the MSA is projected to be between 639,698 and 661,959 in 2010 and between 743,985 and 812,025 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the counties will account for 22.2 percent and 22.3 percent of the state's population in 2010 and 2025, respectively.




Figure 122: Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA Historical Population and Projections



Memphis MSA

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Memphis MSA was defined to be Fayette County, Tennessee (page 206); Shelby County, Tennessee (page 209); Tipton County, Tennessee (page 211); De Soto County, Mississippi (page 172); and Crittenden County, Arkansas (page 41). Based on this definition, from 1969 to 2002, the proportion of the state's population living in the Memphis MSA decreased from 2.5 percent to 1.9 percent. The population in Crittenden County is projected to grow relatively less quickly than the state's population during the projection period. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the MSA will be 1.8 percent and 1.7 percent in 2010 and 2025, respectively.

The population of the Memphis MSA is projected to increase by 120,003 people, or 10.3 percent, from 1.16 million in 2002 to 1.28 million in 2010 and by 442,170 people, or 38.1 percent, to 1.60 million in 2025 (see Table 123). The MSA's population is projected to be between 1.26 million and 1.30 million in 2010 and between 1.54 million and 1.67 million in 2025. Most of the anticipated growth in the MSA is projected to occur in De Soto County, Mississippi and Shelby County, Tennessee.




Figure 124: Memphis MSA Historical Population and Projections




Figure 125: Memphis MSA, New Definition, Historical Population and Projections

Pine Bluff MSA

Prior to June 6, 2003, the Pine Bluff MSA was defined to be Jefferson County, Arkansas. Based on this definition, from 1969 to 2002, the proportion of the state's population living in the Pine Bluff MSA decreased from 4.5 percent to 3.1 percent. The population of Jefferson County is projected to decline during the projection period while the state's population is projected to increase. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the MSA will be 2.8 percent and 2.2 percent in 2010 and 2025, respectively. For a more in-depth discussion of population trends and projections for Jefferson County, the reader is referred to page 75.



Effective June 6, 2003, the MSA is defined to be Cleveland County, Arkansas (page 31); Lincoln County, Arkansas (page 85); and Jefferson County, Arkansas. Based on the new definition, the population of the Pine Bluff MSA is projected to decrease by 1,174 people, or 1.1 percent, from 106,162 in 2002 to 104,988 by 2010 and by 3,852 people, or 3.6 percent, to 102,310 by 2025 (see Table 126). The projected population losses in Jefferson County are expected to outweigh the projected population gains in Cleveland County during the projection period.

The MSA's population is projected to be between 103,554 and 106,463 in 2010 and between 99,436 and 105,398 in 2025. In 2002, the counties constituted 3.9 percent of the state's population. If the baseline projections are realized, the population in the MSA will account for 3.6 percent and 2.9 percent of the state's population in 2010 and 2025, respectively.




Figure 127: Pine Bluff MSA, New Definition, Historical Population and Projections

Texarkana MSA

When the definitions for the Metropolitan Statistical Areas were revised in June 2003, the definition for the Texarkana MSA, Bowie County, Texas (page 213) and Miller County, Arkansas (page 97), was unchanged. In 1969, the proportion of the state's population living in Miller County was 1.7 percent. From 1969 to 2002, the population of Miller County grew

relatively less quickly than the state's population. In 2002, the proportion of the state's population living in Miller County was 1.5 percent.

The population of the Texarkana MSA is projected to increase by 4,916 people, or 3.8 percent, to 135,943 by 2010 and by 14,545 people, or 11.1 percent, to 145,572 by 2025 (see Table 127). The population of the MSA is projected to be between 134,411 and 137,488 in 2010 and between 142,292 and 148,919 in 2025. A majority of the anticipated population growth in the MSA from 2003 to 2025 is projected to be in Bowie County, Texas. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in Miller County will be 1.5 percent and 1.3 percent in 2010 and 2025, respectively.



Population Projections, Planning Areas

Next, it is interesting to analyze population changes over time at a regional level within the state. Determining the number of regions and their composition is an inherently arbitrary and difficult undertaking. Ideally, one would group counties according to several objective criteria, including their geographic location within the state and the profile of each county's economy.

The Arkansas Department of Economic Development (ADED) has given some consideration to this issue and has decomposed the state into five planning areas: Central Arkansas, Northeast Arkansas, Northwest Arkansas, Southeast Arkansas, and Southwest Arkansas. ADED defines these areas by the following counties.

- **Central Arkansas** Cleburne, Conway, Faulkner, Grant, Lonoke, Perry, Prairie, Pulaski, Saline, Van Buren, White, Woodruff, and Yell;
- **Northeast Arkansas** Clay, Craighead, Cross, Fulton, Greene, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Lawrence, Mississippi, Poinsett, Randolph, Sharp, and Stone;
- Northwest Arkansas Baxter, Benton, Boone, Carroll, Crawford, Franklin, Johnson, Logan, Madison, Marion, Newton, Pope, Scott, Searcy, Sebastian, and Washington;
- **Southeast Arkansas** Arkansas, Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Cleveland, Crittenden, Desha, Drew, Jefferson, Lee, Lincoln, Monroe, Phillips, and St. Francis; and
- **Southwest Arkansas** Calhoun, Clark, Columbia, Dallas, Garland, Hempstead, Hot Spring, Howard, Lafayette, Little River, Miller, Montgomery, Nevada, Ouachita, Pike, Polk, Sevier, and Union.




Figure 129: Arkansas Economic Development Planning Areas

Figure 129 provides a graphical presentation of these areas. In order to maintain consistency with the data and literature ADED has published about these areas, the ADED definitions will be used in the subsequent analysis.

Central Arkansas

The population of the Central Arkansas planning area grew by a net 292,158 people, or 58.4 percent, from 500,654 in 1969 to 792,812 in 2002. Of the 13 counties in the planning area, only Prairie County and Woodruff County, both located at the eastern edge of the region, had smaller populations in 2002 than in 1969. For the period, the proportion of the state's population living in the Central Arkansas planning area increased from 26.2 percent to 29.3 percent.

The population of the Central Arkansas planning area is projected to increase by 71,444 people, or 9.0 percent, to 864,256 by 2010 and by 232,620 people, or 29.3 percent, to 1.03 million by 2025. The region's population is projected to be between 847,886 and 881,181 in 2010 and between 978,766 and 1.08 million in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Central Arkansas planning area will be 29.4 percent in 2010 and 29.5 percent in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the Northwest

Arkansas planning area will supplant Central Arkansas as the most populous planning area in 2004.




Figure 130: Central Arkansas Planning Area Historical Population and Projections

Northeast Arkansas

The population of the Northeast Arkansas planning area grew by a net 68,055 people, or 22.1 percent, from 307,737 in 1969 to 375,792 in 2002. Of the 14 counties in the planning area, the following 5 had smaller populations in 2002 than in 1969: Clay, Cross, Jackson, Mississippi, and Poinsett. For the period, the proportion of the state's population living in the Northeast Arkansas planning area decreased from 16.1 percent to 13.9 percent.

The population of the Northeast Arkansas planning area is projected to increase by 12,755 people, or 3.4 percent, to 388,547 by 2010 and by 39,743 people, or 10.6 percent, to 415,535 by 2025. The region's population is projected to be between 375,375 and 402,226 in 2010 and between 385,085 and 448,650 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Northeast Arkansas planning area will be 13.2 percent in 2010 and 11.9 percent in 2025.




Figure 131: Northeast Arkansas Planning Area Historical Population and Projections

Northwest Arkansas

The population of the Northwest Arkansas planning area grew by a net 399,282 people, or 104.7 percent, from 381,259 in 1969 to 780,541 in 2002. All 16 counties in the planning area experienced a net population increase from 1969 to 2002. For the period, the proportion of the state's population living in the Northwest Arkansas planning area increased from 19.9 percent to 28.8 percent.

The population of the Northwest Arkansas planning area is projected to increase by 133,690 people, or 17.1 percent, to 914,231 by 2010 and by 472,693 people, or 60.6 percent, to 1.25 million by 2025. The region's population is projected to be between 887,841 and 941,519 in 2010 and between 1.18 million and 1.33 million in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Northwest Arkansas planning area will be 31.1 percent in 2010 and 36.0 percent in 2025. Again, if the baseline projections are realized, the Northwest Arkansas planning area will become the most populous planning area in the state in 2004.




Figure 132: Northwest Arkansas Planning Area Historical Population and Projections

Southeast Arkansas

The population of the Southeast Arkansas planning area decreased by a net 36,401 people, or 9.7 percent, from 373,362 in 1969 to 336,961 in 2002. Of the 14 counties in the planning area, the following 10 experienced net population declines from 1969 to 2002: Arkansas, Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Desha, Jefferson, Lee, Monroe, Phillips, and St. Francis. For

the period, the proportion of the state's population living in the Southeast Arkansas planning area decreased from 19.5 percent to 12.4 percent.

These figures are most striking when compared to the phenomenal population growth in the Northwest Arkansas planning area during the period. The two regions had roughly the same population in 1969. Whereas population in the Northwest Arkansas planning area more than doubled from 1969 to 2002, the population in the Southeast Arkansas planning area fell by nearly 10.0 percent.

The population of the Southeast Arkansas planning area is projected to decrease by 6,189 people, or 1.8 percent, to 330,772 by 2010 and by 17,665 people, or 5.2 percent, to 319,296 by 2025. The region's population is projected to be between 323,786 and 337,972 in 2010 and between 306,292 and 333,175 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Southeast Arkansas planning area will be 11.3 percent in 2010 and 9.2 percent in 2025.




Figure 133: Southeast Arkansas Planning Area Historical Population and Projections

Southwest Arkansas

The population of the Southwest Arkansas planning area increased by a net 73,985 people, or 21.1 percent, from 349,988 in 1969 to 423,973 in 2002. Of the 18 counties in the planning area, the following 6 experienced net population declines from 1969 to 2002: Columbia, Dallas, Lafayette, Nevada, Ouachita, and Union. Because of strong population growth in Northwest Arkansas and Central Arkansas, the proportion of the state's population living in the Southwest Arkansas planning area decreased from 18.3 percent to 15.6 percent.

The population of the Southwest Arkansas planning area is projected to increase by 13,329 people, or 3.1 percent, to 437,302 by 2010 and by 41,578 people, or 9.8 percent, to 465,551 by 2025. The region's population is projected to be between 426,360 and 448,601 in 2010 and between 442,341 and 490,440 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Southwest Arkansas planning area will be 14.9 percent in 2010 and 13.4 percent in 2025.




Figure 134: Southwest Arkansas Planning Area Historical Population and Projections

Population Projections, State of Arkansas

Of the 75 counties in Arkansas, 52 experienced a net population increase from 1969 to 2002. Population losses for the period occurred primarily in the southeastern counties and were more than offset by population gains in the central and northwestern part of the state. The state's population increased by a net 797,079 people, or 41.7 percent, from 1,913,000 in 1969 to 2,710,079 in 2002.

From 1969 to 1972, the state's population became increasingly concentrated in metropolitan areas. Based on the definitions in use prior to June 6, 2003, the proportion of the state's population that lived in an MSA was 44.5 percent in 1969 and 50.2 percent in 2002. Using the updated definitions, the proportion of the state's population that lived in an MSA was 47.3 in 1969 and 54.1 percent in 2002.

The population of Arkansas is projected to increase by 225,029 people, or 8.3 percent, from 2,710,079 in 2002 to 2,935,108 by 2010 and by 768,969 people, or 28.4 percent, to 3,479,048 by 2025. The state's population is projected to be between 2,861,248 and 3,011,499 in 2010 and between 3,290,055 and 3,682,444 in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the state's population will exceed 3 million in 2013.

The concentration of the state's population in MSAs is projected to continue throughout the projection period. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population that lives in an MSA (using the old definitions) will be 52.4 percent in 2010 and 57.0 percent in 2025. This further highlights the need for government and private planners and decision-makers to make appropriate and sufficient infrastructure investments so that growth can be accommodated and supported rather than be stymied.




Figure 135: State of Arkansas Historical Population and Projections

Summary and Conclusions

This report has provided population projections for all 75 counties in Arkansas, the counties and parishes bordering Arkansas, the state's 7 Metropolitan Statistical Areas, 5 planning areas, and the state in aggregate. The report is intended to be used for planning and research by government, businesses, researchers, and the general public.

If the baseline projections are realized, Benton County will likely surpass Washington County as the second most populous county in the state in 2003 and will become the most populous county in Arkansas by 2025. The population of Benton County and Pulaski County is projected to be between 382,009 and 422,270 and between 391,758 and 398,634 in 2025, respectively. Washington County's population is projected to be between 255,736 and 299,689 in 2025. Calhoun County, located in south-central Arkansas, is projected to remain the least populous county in the state through 2025.

The proportion of the state's population living in an MSA, using the definitions in use prior to June 6, 2003, increased from 44.5 percent in 1969 to 50.2 percent. This phenomenon is projected to continue through 2025. The proportion of the state's population living in an MSA is projected to increase to 52.4 percent in 2010 and 57.0 percent in 2025.

Relatively strong population growth is expected to occur in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA, the Fort Smith MSA, the Jonesboro MSA, and the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA through 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA will increase from 12.3 percent in 2002 to 19.5 in 2025. As a proportion of the state's population, the population living in the Arkansas counties of the Fort Smith MSA is projected to increase from 6.4 percent in 2002 to 6.7 percent in 2025.

If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Jonesboro MSA is projected to increase from 3.1 percent in 2002 to 3.2 percent in 2025. A majority of the projected population gains for the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA are projected to occur in Faulkner County and Saline County. If the baseline projections are realized, the Little Rock-North Little Rock MSA will account for 22.3 percent of the state's population in 2025, up from 22.0 percent in 2002.

Population growth is anticipated to continue in the Central, Northeast, Northwest, and Southwest planning areas. Growth is projected to be relatively strong in Central Arkansas and Northwest Arkansas during the projection period. The population of Southeast Arkansas is projected to decline through 2025.

If the baseline projections are realized, the Central Arkansas area will constitute 29.5 percent of the state's population, up from 29.3 percent in 2002. Even stronger growth is projected to occur in the Northwest Arkansas area. If the baseline projections are realized, the proportion of the state's population living in the Northwest Arkansas planning area will increase from 28.8 percent in 2002 to 36.0 percent in 2025. In contrast, the proportion of the state's population living in the Southeast Arkansas planning area is projected to decline from 12.4 percent in 2002 to 9.2 percent in 2025, according to the baseline projections.

While different regions within the state are expected to experience different rates of population growth and decay, the population of Arkansas in aggregate is projected to increase by roughly 225,000 people from 2.71 million in 2002 to 2.94 million and by roughly 770,000 people to 3.48 million in 2025. The state's population is projected to be between 2.86 million and 3.01 million in 2010 and between 3.29 million and 3.68 million in 2025. If the baseline projections are realized, the state's population will exceed 3 million in 2013.
