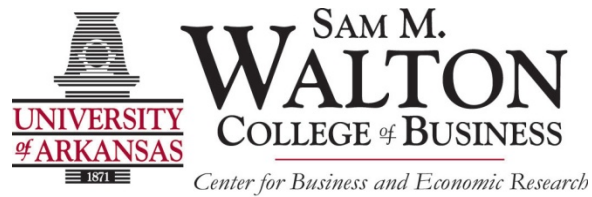


**City of Fayetteville Data Support
Q2 2009**

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Executive Summary

The Center for Business and Economic Research (Center) has committed to provide to the City of Fayetteville a quarterly socio-economic data update. During the second quarter of 2009, the following data points and trends were observed:

- The Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA witnessed a 0.4 percentage point increase in the unemployment rate from 4.6 percent in December 2008 to 5.0 percent in April 2009. Unemployment in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA has grown substantially but has remained low compared to the national unemployment rate. The national unemployment rate in April 2009 was 8.6 percent up from 7.1 percent in December 2008.
- The average number of building permits issued per quarter, which has been declining steadily since the third quarter of 2008, witnessed an increase in the two months of data available for the second quarter of 2009. The actual number of residential permits issued declined to a low of 13 permits at the end of the first quarter of 2009 and climbed back up to 29 in May 2009.
- During the first and second quarters of 2009, the quarterly average of new multi-family permits continued to remain low when compared to the quarterly average of permits issued during the first two quarters of 2008.
- The quarterly average for new commercial permits remained relatively similar during the first and second quarters of 2009 (at 1 and 1.3 permits respectively). This was lower than the quarterly averages for permits issued during the first two quarters of 2008, at 7.3 and 5 permits respectively.
- On average, the City of Fayetteville's sales tax collections in the first three months of 2009 were 3.3% below the collections in the first three months of 2008. A portion of the decrease in sales tax collections can be accounted for by the ongoing national economic recession.
- The cities in Northwest Arkansas did not report any planned changes to impact fees and related development ordinances during the first and second quarters of 2009.

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Introduction

The Center for Business and Economic Research (Center) has committed to provide to the City of Fayetteville a quarterly socio-economic data update. The report is divided into two sections: Economic Data and Demographic Data. The economic data section includes employment figures in the area, wage data, cost of development, tax data and housing data. These data are available on a monthly basis, so trend changes can be identified more quickly. The demographic data draw on a wide variety of local and national data and encompass gender breakdown, age breakdown, income information, educational attainment, and information about institutions of higher learning in the area. These data are released on an annual basis, and the most updated information available is included.

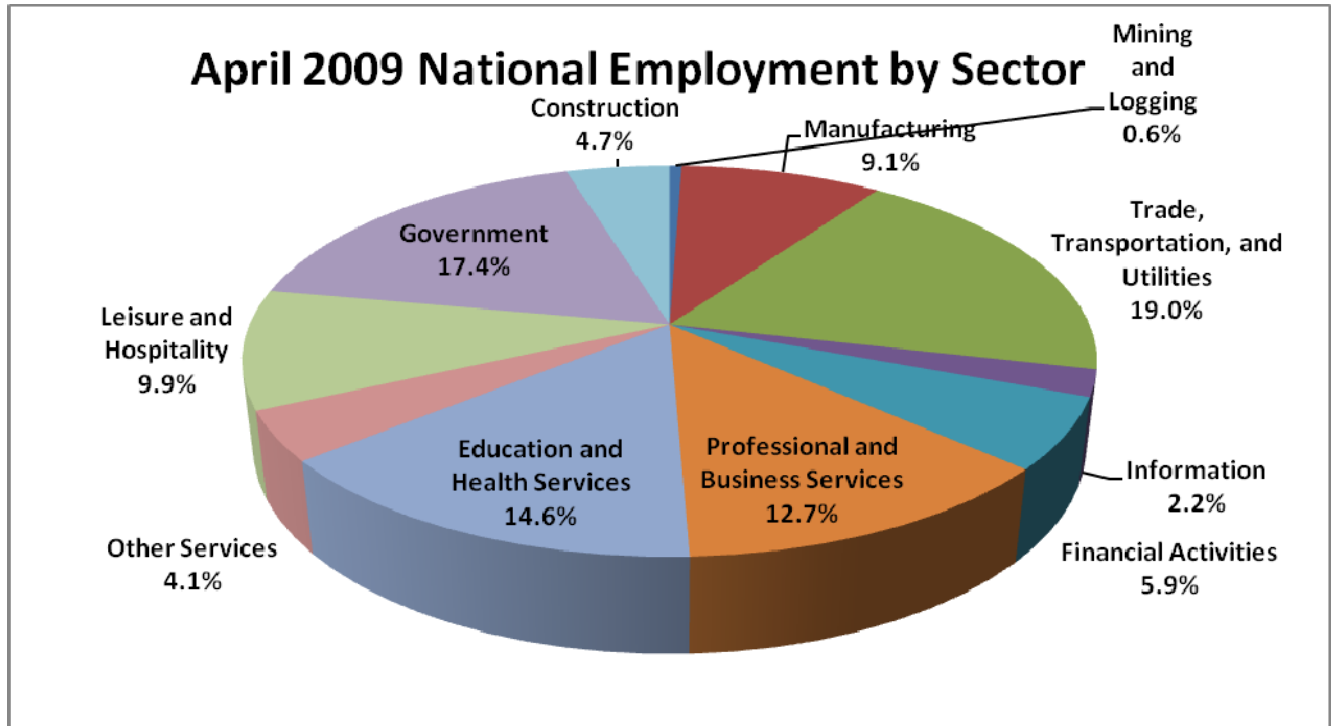

The unemployment rate in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA (which includes Benton, Washington, and Madison Counties in Arkansas and McDonald County, Missouri) was 5.0 percent in April 2009, higher than the December 2008 level but lower than the preceding months in 2009. The average unemployment rate in the first quarter of 2009 was 5.7 percent, which was higher than the average unemployment rate of 3.8% during the first quarter of 2008. The Northwest Arkansas rate remained substantially lower than the April 2009 national level of 8.6 percent.

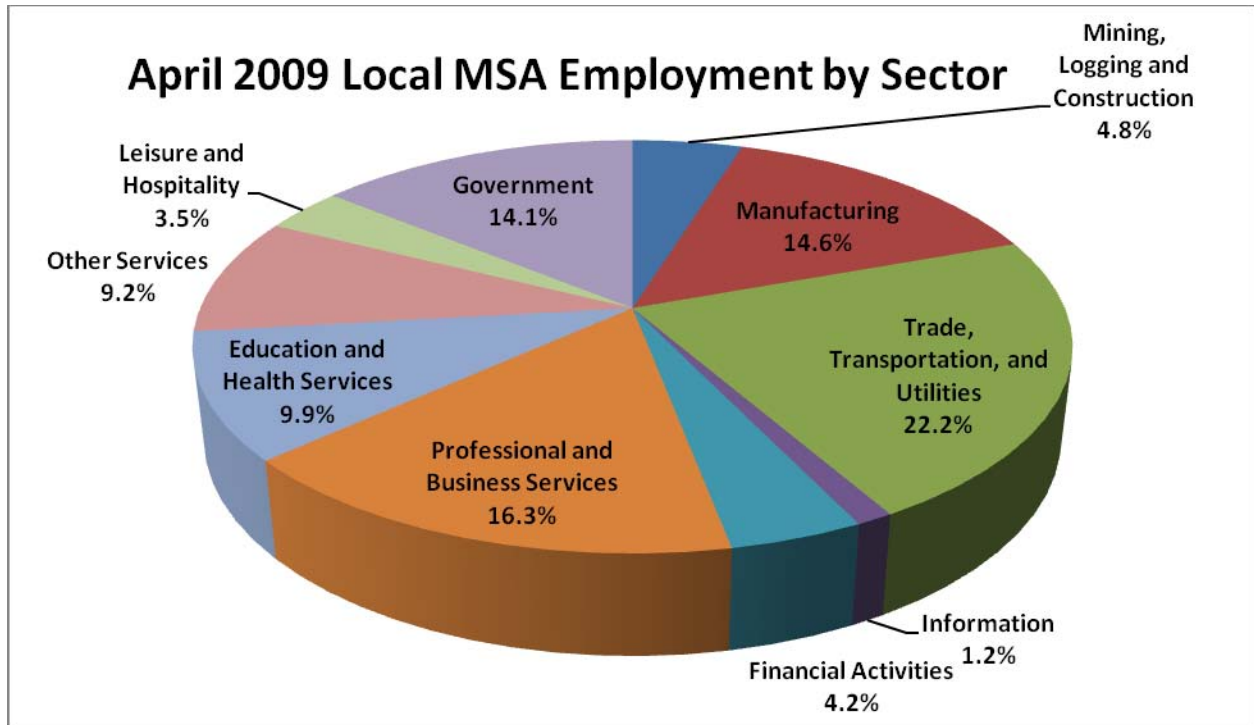
Figure 1: April 2009 National Employment by Sector

In April 2009, the Trade Transportation and Utilities, Government, and Education and Health Services sectors were among the leading employment sectors nationally. Manufacturing accounted for 9.1 percent of employment.

This chart shows the employment by industry in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA. The local area was dominated by the Trade, Transportation and Utilities and Professional and Business Services sectors. Manufacturing was third with 14.6 percent of the employment in April 2009. These three sectors have consistently been the leading employment sectors in the region.

The preceding table shows the occupational wage comparisons for the Fayetteville-Springdale- Rogers MSA and the average national wages. The median hourly wage and average annual wage for all occupations was \$13.79 and \$36,410 according to 2008 data. Both wages were lower than the national median hourly wage and national average annual wage. Wages in the Farming, Fishing and Forestry and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations were higher than the national wages in the sectors.

The table above shows the Cost of Development Index for the cities of Springdale, Rogers and Bentonville and the state of Arkansas with respect to Fayetteville. The development index was recalculated on September 12, 2008 by compiling fees levied on different building types for a variety of services such as water, sewage, public safety, roads, parks, libraries, etc. The City of Fayetteville is indexed at 100, allowing a percentage comparison for the cost of development in neighboring cities. For example, the residential cost of development in the City of Springdale is 36 percent of the cost in Fayetteville.

Changes to impact fees and development ordinances were not implemented in cities across Northwest Arkansas during the first and second quarters of 2009.

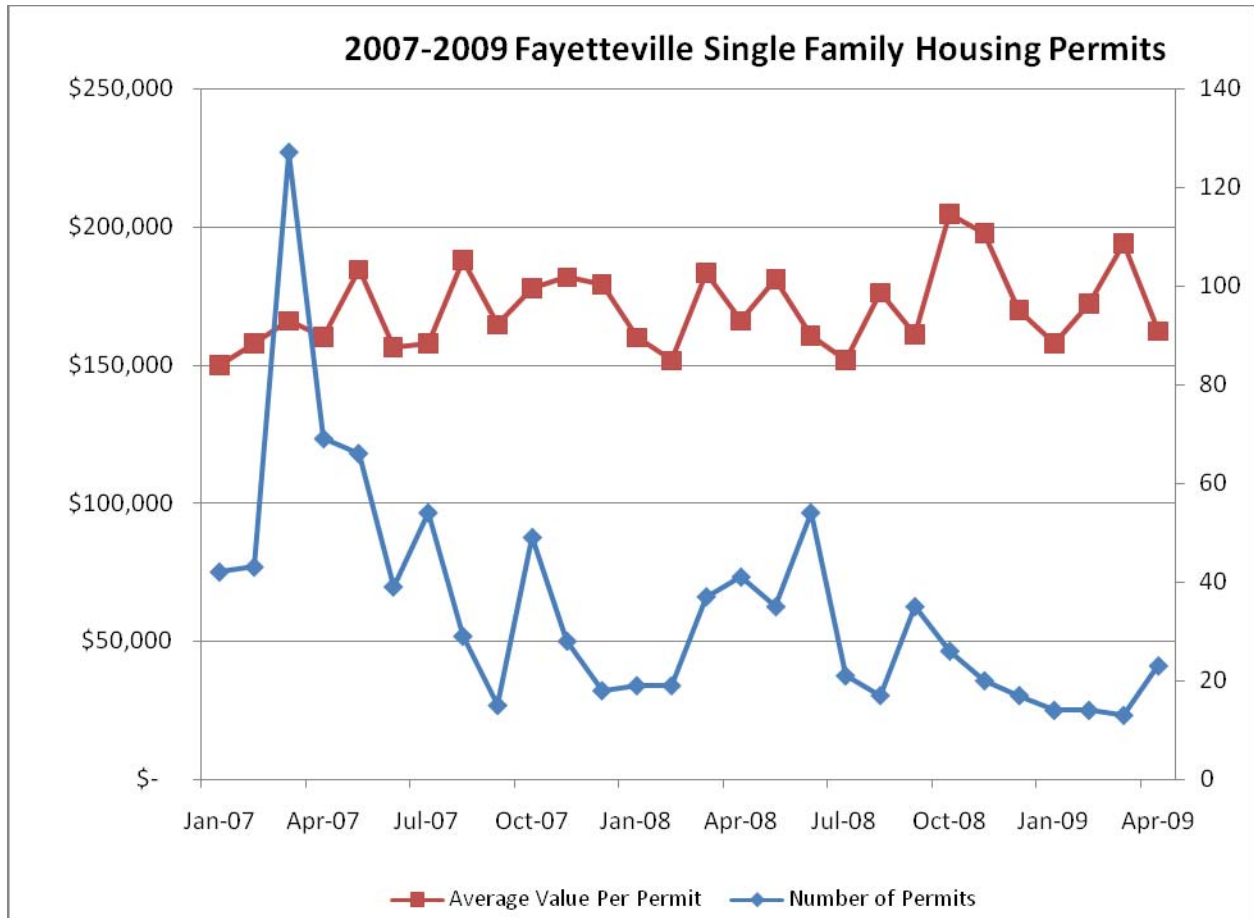

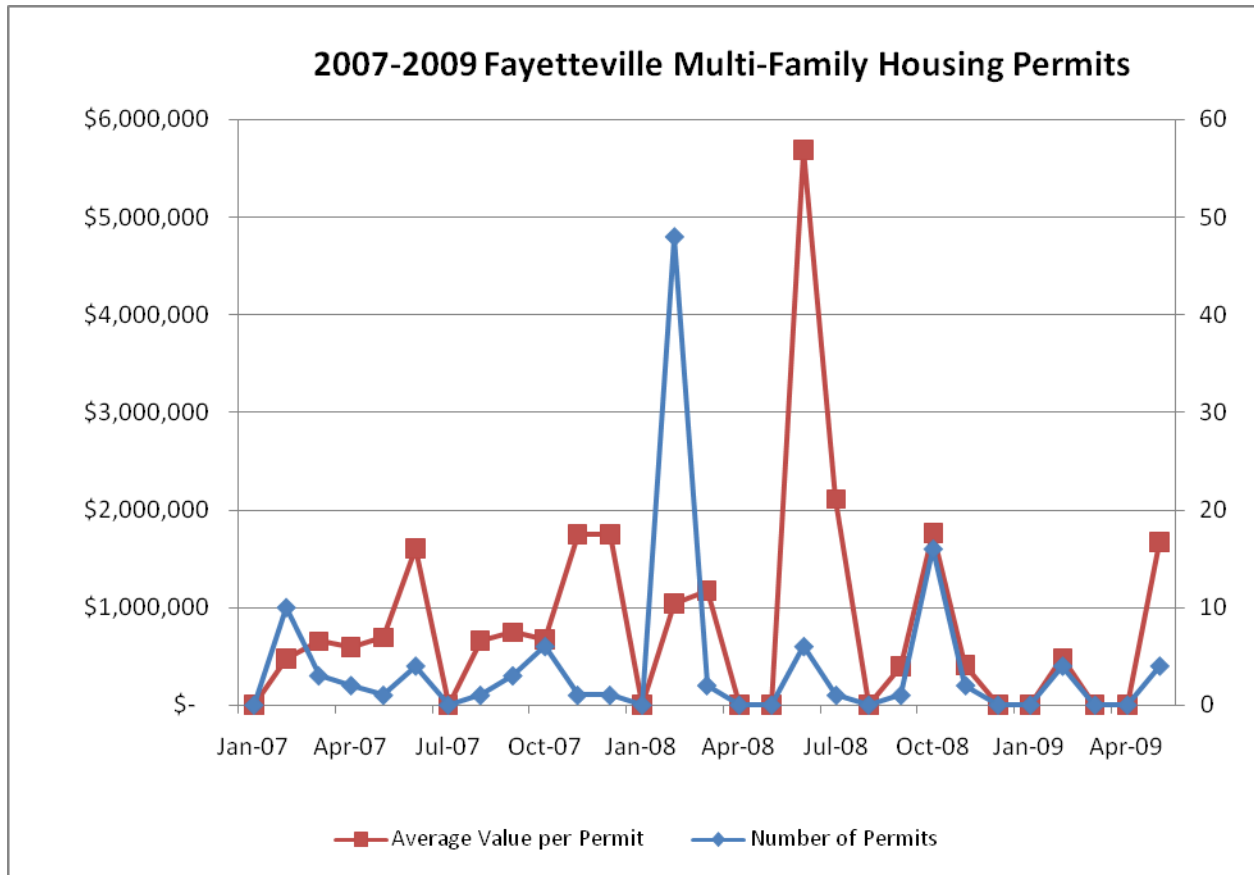
Figure 3: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Single Family Housing Permits

The chart above represents the permits issued for new single family housing units in Fayetteville. While the number of single family permits has declined steadily since the third quarter of last year, the average value per permit continued to fluctuate in a range between \$150,000 and \$200,000. The average number of permits issued per quarter which has been declining steadily since the third quarter of 2008 witnessed an increase in the two months of data available for the second quarter of 2009. The actual number of permits issued which declined to a low of 13 permits at the end of the first quarter of 2009 and had climbed back up to 29 in May 2009. Similar reversals in downward trends were observed in the quarterly averages for total permitted area per month and total value of permits per month.

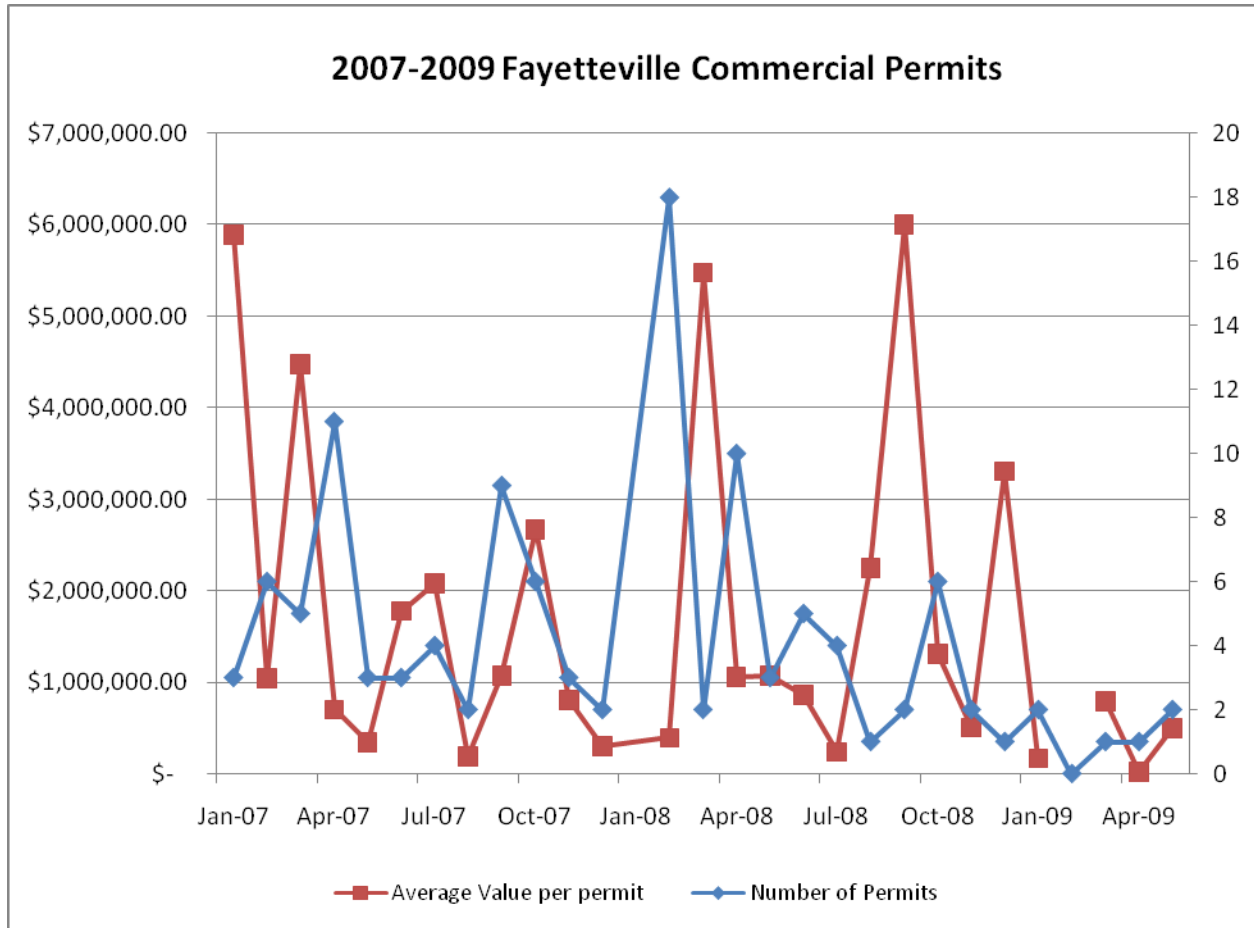
Figure 4: 2007-2009 Multi-Family Housing Permits

The average value per permit and the number of permits have remained relatively steady during the time period between January 2007 and May 2009. The quarterly average of multi-family permits remained 1.3 permits during the first and second quarters of 2009 (4 permits were issued in each quarter). The turmoil in the market meant that 2009's permits were lower than the quarterly averages for the first and second quarters of 2008 which were 16.67 and 2.0 permits respectively.

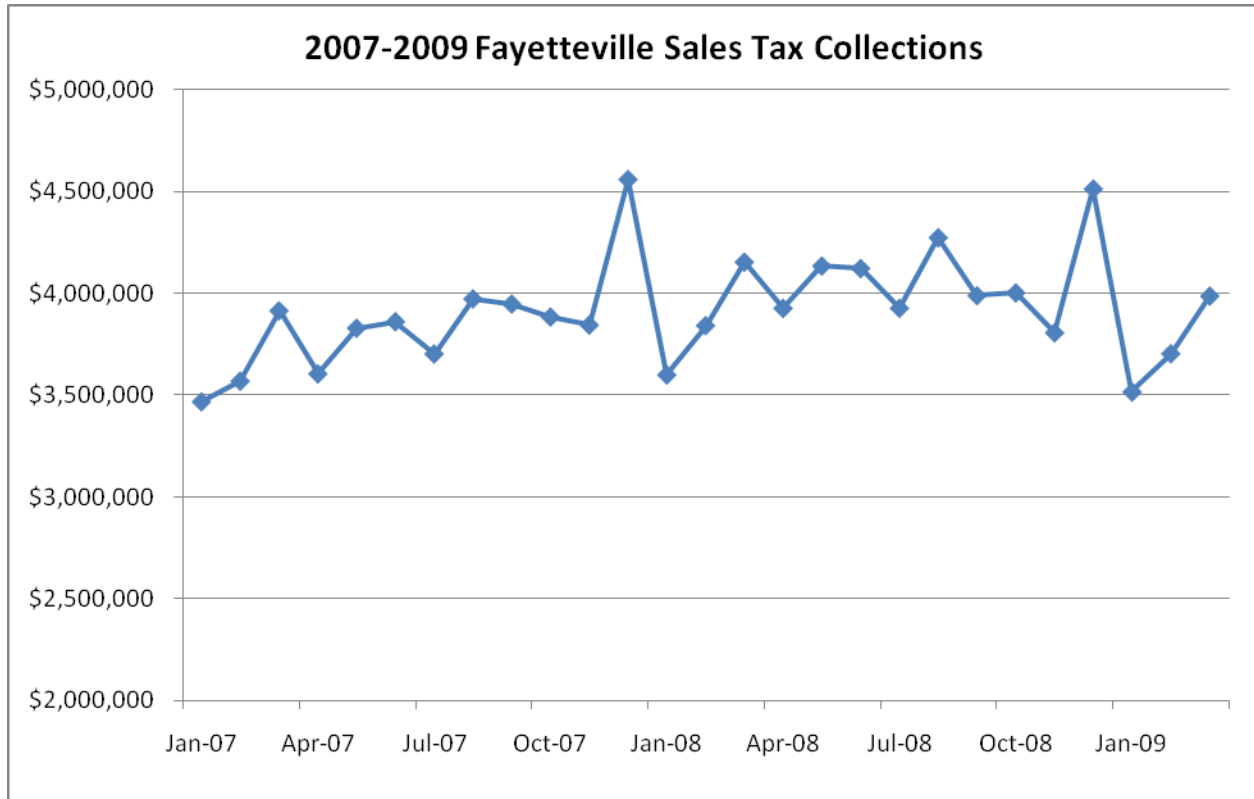
Figure 5: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Commercial Permits

The quarterly average for new commercial permits remained relatively similar during the first and second quarters of 2009 (at 1 and 1.3 permits respectively). This was lower than the quarterly averages for permits issued during the first two quarters of 2008, at 7.3 and 5 permits respectively. 6 new permits were issued in the first and second quarter of 2009, compared to 38 during the same period in 2008. The average value per commercial permit remained low throughout 2009 when compared to the similar months in 2008.

Figure 6: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Sales Tax Collections

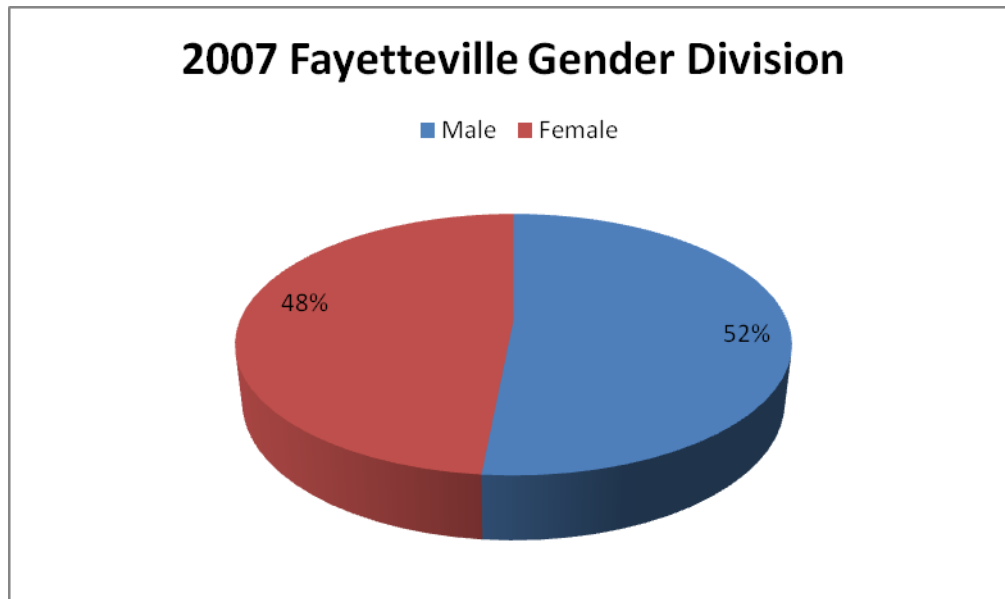

From January to March 2009, the City of Fayetteville collected \$11,211,985 in sales taxes. On average, the sales tax collections in the first three months of 2009 were 3.3% below the collections in the first three months of 2008. In 2008, the City of Fayetteville collected \$48,310,800 in sales taxes. During 2007, the City of Fayetteville collected \$46,180,495 in sales taxes and \$1,252,489 in property taxes. The sales taxes collected in 2008 were on average 4.7 percent higher than collections for the same months in 2007. A portion of the increased sales tax collections may be accounted for recent changes to streamline sales tax distribution. The sales tax changed from 1.75 percent in 2006 to 2 percent in 2007, accounting for the net increase in tax collections in 2007. The city collected \$25,445,756 in sales tax and \$1,109,151 in property tax during 2006.

Demographic Information

The chart above shows that males comprised 52 percent of the population of the city of Fayetteville according to 2007 census data estimates. In 2007, slightly more than 50 percent of the national population was female (50.7%).

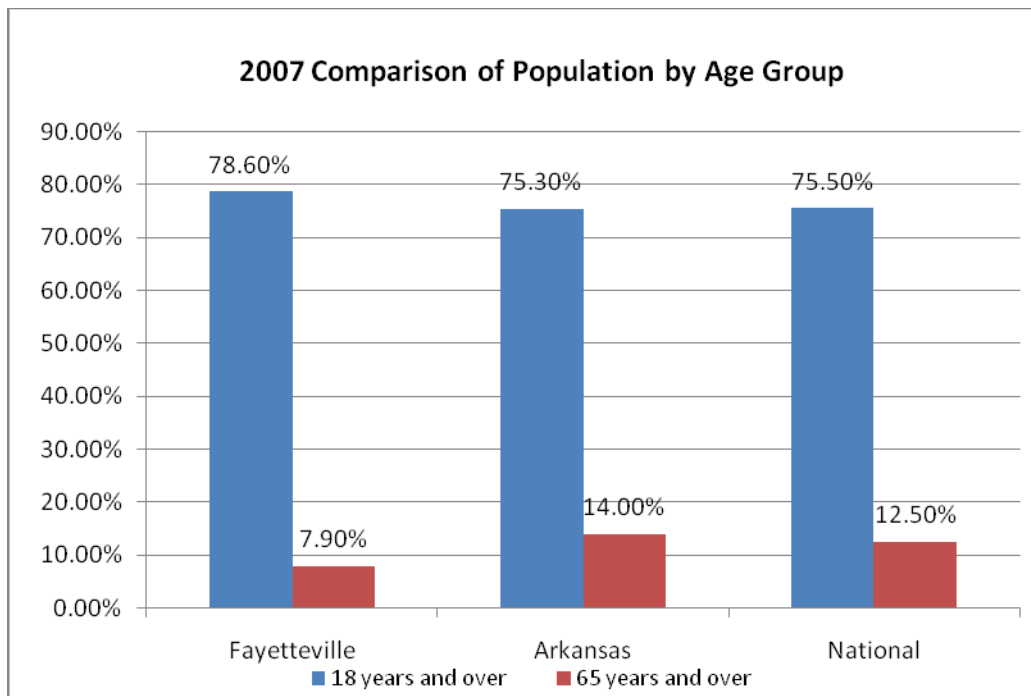

The 2007 census data list the number of persons in each age group. The age groups 25-34 years and 20-24 years have the highest number of Fayetteville residents. The medianⁱ age of Fayetteville residents was 27.8. This was significantly lower than the state's median age of 37 and the national median age of 36.7.

According to the 2007 census data, 78.6 percent of the population in Fayetteville was 18 years or older and 7.9 percent of the population was 65 years or older. The population in the 65 years or older group was at least 4 percent lower when compared to the state and national census data.

17.1 percent of non-family households in Fayetteville fall within the income group, \$35,000-\$49,999, while, 14.2 percent of family households are in the income group, \$50,000-\$74,999. The middle class comprises the largest section of the population in Fayetteville. The median income for all households in Fayetteville was \$35,725 and the average income was \$55,227. Both figures were lower than the national median and average incomes.

In Fayetteville, the 2007 census data show that 15.1 percent of families and 20.4 percent of people live below the poverty level. The figures were at least 5 percent higher than the respective national percentages.

The median earning for full-time female workers was more than \$10,000 lower than the median earnings for their male counterparts in the workforce. The highest percentage of female workers earned incomes in the range \$1-\$9,999, while male workers were evenly spread between incomes in the ranges \$15,000-\$24,999, \$25,000-\$34,999 and \$35,000-\$49,999. While 5.9 percent of males earned incomes that were higher than \$100,000, only 2.1 percent of women earned incomes in the same range. College graduates in the area earned incomes more than \$19,000 higher than those with associate degrees. The income difference between males and females persisted at all levels of educational attainment.
