Executive Summary

The Center for Business and Economic Research (Center) has committed to provide to the City of Fayetteville a quarterly socio-economic data update. During the second quarter of 2009, the following data points and trends were observed:

- The Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA witnessed a 1.2 percentage point increase in the unemployment rate from 5.0 percent in April 2009 to 6.2 percent in July 2009. Unemployment in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA has grown substantially, but has remained low compared to the national unemployment rate. The national unemployment rate in July 2009 was 9.7 percent, up from 8.6 percent in April 2009.
- The total number of residential building permits issued in Fayetteville per quarter, which has been declining steadily since the third quarter of 2008, increased during the second quarter of 2009 and the first month of the third quarter. The monthly number of residential permits issued declined to a low of 13 permits in March 2009 and climbed back up to 28 in June 2009.
- In Fayetteville, during the first and second quarters of 2009, the number of newly issued multifamily building permits continued to remain low when compared to the number of permits issued during the first two quarters of 2008.
- The number of new Fayetteville commercial building permits issued was small during the first and second quarters of 2009 (at 3 and 4 permits, respectively). In the first two quarters of 2008, there were 22 and 15 commercial permits issued, so the year-over-year decline was substantial. However, in July 2009, there were four commercial building permits issued (as many as in the entire second quarter of the year). On average, the City of Fayetteville's sales tax collections in the second quarter of 2009 were 10.6% below the collections in the second quarter of 2008. A portion of the decrease in sales tax collections can be attributed to an overall decline in consumer spending associated with the ongoing national economic recession.
- During the second quarter of 2009, the City of Fayetteville increased its Water and Sewer impact fees, while the City of Bentonville decreased its Water and Sewer impact fees.

Introduction

The Center for Business and Economic Research (Center) has committed to provide to the City of Fayetteville a quarterly socio-economic data update. The report is divided into two sections: Economic Data and Demographic Data. The economic data section includes employment figures in the area, wage data, cost of development, tax data and housing data. These data are available on a monthly basis, so trend changes can be identified more quickly. The demographic data draw on a wide variety of local and national data and encompass gender breakdown, age breakdown, income information, educational attainment, and information about institutions of higher learning in the area. These data are released on an annual basis, and the most updated information available is included.

The unemployment rate in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA (which includes Benton, Washington, and Madison Counties in Arkansas and McDonald County, Missouri) was 6.2 percent in July 2009, higher than all the preceding months in 2009. The average unemployment rate in the second quarter of 2009 was 5.5 percent and was higher than the average unemployment rate of 3.8% during the second quarter of 2008. However, the second quarter average unemployment rate in 2009 was lower than the first quarter average unemployment rate in 2009 at 5.7%. The Northwest Arkansas unemployment rate remained substantially lower than the July 2009 national level of 9.7 percent.




Figure 1: July 2009 National Employment by Sector

In July 2009, the Trade Transportation and Utilities, Government, and Education and Health Services sectors were among the leading employment sectors nationally. Manufacturing accounted for 9.0 percent of national employment.




Figure 2: July 2009 Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers Local MSA Employment by Sector

Figure 2 shows employment by industry in the Fayetteville-Springdale-Rogers MSA. The local area was dominated by the Trade, Transportation and Utilities and Professional and Business Services sectors. Manufacturing was third with 14.7 percent of the region's employment in July 2009. These three sectors have consistently been the leading employment sectors in the region.

The preceding table shows the occupational wage comparisons for the Fayetteville-Springdale- Rogers MSA and the average national wages. The median hourly wage and average annual wage for all occupations were \$13.79 and \$36,410 according to 2008 data. Both wages were lower than their national counterparts. Average wages in the Farming, Fishing and Forestry and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations in the Northwest Arkansas MSA were higher than the national average wages in the sectors.

The table above shows the Cost of Development Index for the cities of Springdale, Rogers and Bentonville and the state of Arkansas with respect to Fayetteville. The development index was recalculated on September 15, 2009 by compiling fees levied on different building types for a variety of services such as water, sewage, public safety, roads, parks, libraries, etc. The City of Fayetteville is indexed at 100, allowing a percentage comparison for the cost of development in neighboring cities. For example, the residential cost of development in the City of Springdale is 30 percent of the cost in Fayetteville. Changes to impact fees were made in the Cities of Bentonville and Fayetteville during the second quarter. The City of Fayetteville increased its Water and Sewer impact fees while the City of Bentonville decreased its Water and Sewer impact fees.




Figure 3: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Single Family Housing Permits

The chart above represents the monthly number of permits issued and monthly average permit values for new single family housing units in Fayetteville. After increasing slightly in April and May 2009, the number of single family permits issued declined again in July. The average value per permit continued to fluctuate in a range between \$150,000 and \$200,000. The total number of permits issued per quarter, which has been declining steadily since the third quarter of 2008, increased during the second quarter of 2009 and the first month of the third quarter. The monthly number of permits issued, which declined to a low of 13 permits in March2009, had climbed back up to 28 in June 2009.




Figure 4: 2007-2009 Multi-Family Housing Permits

The average value per multifamily building permit and the number of multifamily building permits issued have remained relatively low but steady during the first two quarters of 2009. The quarterly number of multi-family permits issued was 4 in both the first and second quarters of 2009. The turmoil in the local real estate market meant that multifamily building activity in 2009 so far has been substantially lower than in 2008. In fact, in the first and second quarters of 2008, 50 and 6 multifamily permits were issued, respectively.




Figure 5: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Commercial Permits

The number of new commercial building permits issued was relatively similar during the first and second quarters of 2009 (at 3 and 4 permits, respectively). July, the first month in the third quarter had four commercial permits issued, more than in any other month of 2009. The quarterly totals in 2009 were lower than the quarterly totals of permits issued during the first two quarters of 2008, at 22 and 15 permits, respectively. A total of 7 new permits were issued in the first and second quarters of 2009, compared to 38 during the same period in 2008. The average value per commercial permit remained low throughout 2009 when compared to the similar months in 2008.





Figure 6: 2007-2009 Fayetteville Sales Tax Collections



During the second quarter of 2009, the City of Fayetteville collected \$11,048,682 in sales taxes. This represented a slight drop from the \$11,211,985 collected during the first quarter of 2009. Sales tax collections in the second quarter of 2009 were 10.6% below collections in the second quarter of 2008. In 2008, the City of Fayetteville collected a total of \$48,310,800 in sales taxes. During 2007, the City of Fayetteville collected a total of \$46,180,495 in sales taxes and \$1,252,489 in property taxes. The sales taxes collected in 2008 were on average 4.7 percent higher than collections for the same months in 2007. A portion of the increased sales tax collections from that time period are due to changes to streamline sales tax distribution. The sales tax rate changed from 1.75 percent in 2006 to 2 percent in 2007, accounting for the net increase in tax collections in 2007. The city collected \$25,445,756 in sales tax and \$1,109,151 in property tax during 2006.




Figure 7: 2007 Fayetteville Gender Breakdown

The chart above shows that males comprised 52 percent of the population of the city of Fayetteville according to 2007 census data estimates. In 2007, slightly more than 50 percent of the national population was female (50.7%).




Figure 8: 2007 Comparison of Population by Age Group

17.1 percent of non-family households in Fayetteville fall within the income group, \$35,000-\$49,999, while, 14.2 percent of family households are in the income group, \$50,000-\$74,999. The middle class comprises the largest section of the population in Fayetteville. The median income for all households in Fayetteville was \$35,725 and the average income was \$55,227. Both figures were lower than the national median and average incomes.

In Fayetteville, the 2007 census data show that 15.1 percent of families and 20.4 percent of people live below the poverty level. The figures were at least 5 percent higher than the respective national percentages.

The median earning for full-time female workers was more than \$10,000 lower than the median earnings for their male counterparts in the workforce. The highest percentage of female workers earned incomes in the range \$1-\$9,999, while male workers were evenly spread between incomes in the ranges \$15,000-\$24,999, \$25,000-\$34,999 and \$35,000-\$49,999. While 5.9 percent of males earned incomes that were higher than \$100,000, only 2.1 percent of women earned incomes in the same range. College graduates in the area earned incomes more than \$19,000 higher than those with associate degrees. The income difference between males and females persisted at all levels of educational attainment.

According to the 2007 census data, more females in Fayetteville had college degrees in the age group 18-24, while more males had college degrees in the age groups 25 and over. 44.72 percent of Fayetteville's residents who are 25 years or older have some Bachelor's degree of higher, a figure that is significantly higher than the national figure of 27.5 percent for the same age group.
